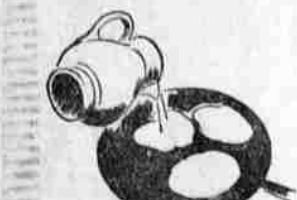

FRIGHTENED SHEEP
DROWNED IN CREEK

GLENDALE, March 3.—A flock of more than 200 sheep belonging to C. S. Henningsen of this city and pastured on the Gail Hamilton place on Cow creek and endeavored to cross Cow creek with the result that 57 were drowned. Nearly 50 were rescued with difficulty from a small island in the creek on which they were huddled. The sheep had just been placed in a pasture alongside the creek and were nearly all ewes about to lamb. A dog is thought to have frightened the sheep, according to Mr. Henningsen.

MAIL CONTACT
ON ANCHOR ROUTE
GIVEN E. C. THRONE

GLENDALE, March 3.—The job of carrying the mail from Astoria over a 15-mile route to Anchor, on upper Cow Creek has been let to Edward C. Throne of the Double W ranch at Anchor. The award is for a period of four years, commencing July 1, 1930, and he succeeded Charles Dewey who has been carrying the mail since Ed Belcher gave up this route a few years ago. A mail bag service thrice weekly is given along the route from Astoria postoffice to Anchor.

Mr. Throne is well known here as he was a Glendale resident for many years. He conducted a hand here for many years and is evidently an able corner player having played with a number of large hands in times past. During recent years he has devoted most of his time to a ranch on upper Cow creek where he now resides.

GLENDALE FIELD
LIGHTS INSTALLED

GLENDALE, March 3.—Installation of the field lighting and beacon at the federal emergency landing field east of this city, adjoining the Avalon ranch belonging to Garrett and Son, was completed last week and put into service Saturday evening. The field lights consist of 16 boundary lights placed approximately 300 feet apart, outlining the flying field. The lights at the ends of the field are green, the others are white. All electric wiring is in underground conduits. A high steel tower just northeast of the landing field carries a beacon light of the flasher type which gives a code signal and the field number. This tower also carries an illuminated wind sock to show direction of wind at the field. A shed, 10x14, of advanced sheet metal has been built at one corner of the field to house emergency supplies for the use of mail planes.

COUGAR KILLED ON GAME RESERVE

GLENDALE, March 3.—Ted Arner, state predatory animal hunter from Myrtle Creek, killed a big

cougar on Dads creek last week. Arner says there are signs of two more cougars in the same locality and he has hopes that his dogs will be able to track them down soon.

A total of 32 cougars have been reported killed the past 2 years within the game reserve lying east of the railroad and west of the Pacific highway between Glendale and Riddle. Hunters familiar with the habits of the cougar estimate that ordinarily a cougar will kill 50 deer per year on an average.

Arner uses specially trained hounds secured from Arizona to track cougars. These wonderfully keen scented dogs can "cold track" a cougar trail three days old and under favorable ground and weather conditions have been known to follow a trail a week old. These dogs will also track bear. Last fall Arner had the misfortune to lose a valuable dog on account of a bear.

PORTLAND, March 3.—Rice and butter prices were steady and unchanged when the market opened today. Butter displayed a firm tone, with eggs scarcely better than steady.

The orange price has slipped up to 5 and 5 1/2, but new potatoes from Florida declined from 25c to 15c and 16c. Tomatoes were also cheaper at 15c to 14c.
