DOUGLAS HAS GOOD RECORD IN FIGHT AGAINST SCOURGE

Mrs. H. C. Boyle, who was a delegate to the fifteenth annual meeting of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, which met in Portland recently, reported upon her return home that the two-day health session was one of the most interesting and valuable occasions of its kind ever held in the state, and that many matters were discussed there which will be of help to the Douglas county public health association in its disease prevention and health conservation work in this county.

With Mrs. Boyle was Mrs. Stanley Chapin, of Reedsport. The report of the activities of this county's health association for 1929 was read by Mrs. Boyle. Twenty counties in the state were reported to have exceeded their 1928 sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals (this county being one of them) with the total sale for the state 5,500,000 seals or \$55,000. The returns from the annual Christmas seal sale are the only source of funds for the work of the local association.

"We are all so pleased with the excellent record that our own county health association has made during the past year," Mrs. Boyle said, "but it could not have been possible without the excellent cooperation of so many people in this county. So many people in this county are so proud of the excellent health record of our county which is shown in the fact that Douglas county is one of the 29 counties of the state that has a public health association affiliated with the Oregon Tuberculosis association, one of the 22 counties that have a county public health nursing service."

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COOLIDGE SPEAKS AT ARIZONA DAM

COOLIDGE DAM, Ariz., March 5.—Coolidge dam, towering, iron-domed barrier of steel and concrete which holds back the turbulent waters of the Gila river, today stands dedicated, a monument to Uncle Sam's faith in the most pastoral of southwestern Indian tribes—the Arizona Pimas.

The huge structure, formally dedicated yesterday by Calvin Coolidge, former president of the United States, in whose honor it was named, will provide irrigation water first for 40,000 acres of land in the Pima Indian reservation, and then water for an additional 40,000 acres in the Florence-Casa Grande valleys of the lower Gila.

The dam proper stands at the head of Box canyon in the Apache reservation and will form a lake, when filled, which will bury the Apache trail post of San Carlos beneath 12 feet of water.

Standing on the parapet of the dam, Mr. Coolidge dedicated the project to the "advancement of religion, education, better homes and a better country." In the same brief speech he also called upon the people of the southwest to dedicate themselves to the task of completing the Boulder canyon dam, which he referred to as the "west's greatest reclamation project."

Stressing the importance of water conservation in western states, the former president called upon the states of Arizona and California to settle their differences on the Boulder dam question. He suggested that Arizona and California as well, take their Bibles and read the admonition, "Agree with thine adversary quickly."

APPETITES MUST BE AROUSED
Essential Foods "Go Begging" When Lacking in Flavor

Foods rich in vitamins, minerals and roughage often become tiresome to the taste. This may be due to incorrect cooking or the fact that the food itself is lacking in flavor.

Vegetables are outstanding in the class of foods that "go begging." Spinach is rejected because its flavor is too mild. Tomatoes are often "turned down" because their flavor is too sharp. Carrots and peas, when too old, or cooked too long, become tasteless.

By using sugar to season these vegetables as they cook, their flavor will be noticeably improved. A dash of sugar to a pinch of salt is a good rule to follow. It is surprising how this combination will lighten, for example, the mild flavor of spinach and pleasantly soften the sharp taste of tomatoes.

Doctors and dietitians are heartily in favor of this use of sugar in making essential foods more pleasant to the taste—not only of adults but of children. They also approve the serving of wholesome desserts as a means to introduce variety as well as nourishment in the diet. Most foods are more delicious and nourishing with sugar. The Sugar Institute.
