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BOY SCOUTS' COURT OF HONOR TONIGHT; CONTEST MARCH 24

A court of honor for Boy Scouts of Roseburg and vicinity will be held at the city hall tonight at 7:30. The meeting will be informal until the first examination of the boys after which a formal meeting will be called for the presentation of badges.

Another court of honor will be held near the latter part of the month at which time the scouts will compete for points to count in an achievement round-up contest. Each adult attending that court of honor will count 100 points for the patrol they favor. If every member of a patrol advances at that court, the patrol will win an extra five hundred points besides the points allowed for each advancement. The awards won tonight will be counted for points to count in the contest which begins in earnest on the 10th.

The final contest to determine the champion first aid patrol of Douglas county will be held at the junior high school on Monday evening, March 24, at 7:45 o'clock. The boy scouts have been working on first aid with the idea of preparing themselves to help anyone in need of assistance. A lot of their training has been under circumstances that probably would not be in case of emergencies.

Last year a contest was held with the idea of giving the contestants a chance to prove their ability to serve on short notice. That being the first contest the boys were given a long list of first aid problems to practice with the understanding that five of the same would be used for contest problems. This year they are given no advance notice as to what the problems will be nor will they know until they are all set for the contest and open the sealed envelope which they have drawn containing their problem. They will be given two minutes to think out their action and put it to work.

Between now and March 24 each troop in Douglas county will determine which is the best patrol in the troop and have that winning patrol ready for the final contest.

The judges have not been secured yet but will be doctors who have had no part in training patrols of their own choice. In other words, they will be strictly neutral.

This contest will be open to the public and will doubtless prove very interesting to watch.

JUDGE HAMILTON BACK IN ROSEBURG

YOUNGEST SON OF GLADSTONE PASSES

(Associated Press Local Wire) LONDON, March 6.—Viscount Herbert John Gladstone, youngest son of the Victorian statesman, William E. Gladstone, died today of bronchitis. He was 76 years old. He served in parliament and once was home secretary.

In 1910 he accepted a title which his father twice refused—and was appointed first governor general of the Union of South Africa, an office from which he retired in 1914.
