HALL FAVORS TAX CHANGES, DRY LAW, HIGHWAY PROGRAM



Charles Hall of Marshfield, state senator from Coos and Curry counties, formally announced his candidacy throughout Oregon today for the republican nomination for governor at the primaries, May 16. Mr. Hall said he would file with Secretary of State Hoss within the next few days.

At the same time Mr. Hall announced that he would support very definite state-wide policies, including highway program completion, reorganization of state government, economy in state government and a re-adjustment of tax assessment. The senator pledged himself to support conservation of fish and game resources. He said that if elected he would favor state-wide enforcement of the prohibition laws, which he characterized as "an executive program requiring eternal vigilance."

Mr. Hall's platform calls for a uniting of all forces in the state looking toward Oregon's development.

Friends of Mr. Hall in urging that he make the race have pointed to his business and political record as one which well qualifies him for the office of governor.

Starting without resources at 21, when he came here from western Pennsylvania, Mr. Hall in 28 years has successfully engaged in the drug, orchard, telephone and banking business. In the latter fields he has operated large enterprises from which he only recently sold his control.

For three terms he has been state senator. In community and state-wide chamber of commerce work he has been very active. As chairman of the roads and highways committee in the senate when major construction was begun, he has had a vital part in road development.

KRUSE DEFEATS CHARLES STRACK

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6.—Bob Kruse, Portland, won two out of three falls from Charles Strack, Stillwater, Okla., in their heavy-weight wrestling match here last night. Kruse took the first fall in 38 minutes, 30 seconds with a wristlock. Strack evened matters by taking the second fall in five minutes with a back trip and body press. Kruse won the final fall in 12 minutes with an airplane spin.

TURKEY BREEDER IMPROVES FLOCK

George Hall of Oakland, Oregon, one of the oldest breeders of fine turkeys in Douglas county, has received two shipments of Bronze turkeys from prize winning strains. One shipment, consisting of a tom and five hens, was received from Judge A. D. Walker and Buena Vista Turkey Farms at San Diego, California. These turkeys were personally selected by Judge Walker, nationally famous turkey judge, through arrangements made with him while he was in Oakland last December as judge of the Northwest Turkey show.

The other shipment, consisting of one tom and two hens, came from J. C. Clipp and Son, of Campbell, Indiana. Mr. Clipp has been breeding fancy Bronze turkeys for thirty-seven years and has exhibited turkeys for most of the national events in America as well as in Europe. Last fall he won many first prizes at the Kentucky state fair.

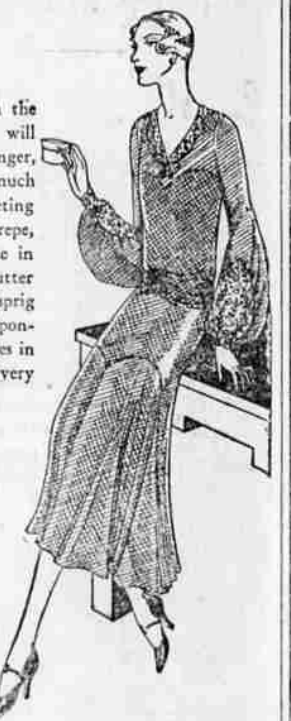

LUMBER INDUSTRY NEEDS U. S. PROP. GREELEY STATES

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
PORTLAND, Ore., March 6.—Government control of the lumber industry insofar as antitrust competition is concerned was advocated today by Colonel W. B. Greeley of the West Coast Lumberman's association at the Western Forestry and Conservation association convention. He cited the present overproduction in the lumber business as a lesson for "the necessity of stabilization."

After asserting that the lumber industry, like oil and coal industries, needs the stabilizing influence of the government, Colonel Greeley discussed conservation and utilization of waste products. He said he knew of one mill in the Pacific northwest which saved from \$400,000 to \$500,000 a year in utilization of waste lumber which was burned formerly. He said the waste was being sold for pulp and fuel.

State legislatures should provide more money for patrol duty, delegates to the convention decided. With more patrol workers, Colonel Greeley said, reforestation would advance more rapidly.

MADDEN, EX-PUG, KILLED IN FALL

WASHINGTON, March 6.—A fall of 20 feet from the steps of the

treasury building during a sight-seeing trip here brought death to Harry Madden, 41-year-old Irish heavyweight pugilist, who became famous for his staying qualities against championship contenders.

Madden came to the United States as holder of the Irish heavyweight championship and was considered a possibility for the world's heavyweight title. While he was not successful in this ambition, prior to 1917 there were few Americans in his weight who could knock Madden down, and in later years he stood up against all of the heavyweight aspirants at one time or another. Recently he was characterized by Gene Tunney as one of the two greatest fighters the former champion had ever met.

ABDUCTION ALLEGED IN DOMESTIC FEUD

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6.—Charged with kidnaping his own father, Richard R. King was arrested in Astoria, Ore., yesterday and Ella King, named in the same warrant, was taken into custody. Kidnaping was alleged in connection with the taking of Nohus King, wealthy lumberman, out of the jurisdiction of Multnomah county courts and has, it was said, as a background a family feud over the King estate.

H. E. Leonard, attorney, legal guardian of the incompetent, made the complaint against King.

NEEDS OF FORESTRY HEARD AT MEETING

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6.—Delegates to the annual convention of the western forestry and conservation association, which ended here yesterday, were scattering to their various homes today after three days of intense study and discussion of problems confronting the timber industry of the far west.

All officers were re-elected. The final session of the association yesterday was largely devoted to a discussion of a cooperative protective agency. H. J. Eberly, Oregon state forest department, told the delegates western reforestation laws would exert a great influence upon the advancement of the protective agency. Laws compelling the constant patrolling of private forest areas, he said, undoubtedly would have an effect upon the morale of the owner.

Chief Forester R. Y. Stuart, in a paper read before the meeting, strongly advocated development of a protective association. "Our efforts should be to minimize the necessity of spending money in suppressing fires by more adequate protection measures," he said.

PENDLETON GRAIN MEN SEE CHINESE BUSINESS

PENDLETON, March 6.—There is much interest being shown in local grain circles on the McMaster resolution to purchase \$25,000,000 worth of American grain to be used

in relieving famine stricken China. The chamber of commerce of Pendleton has wired the Oregon representation in congress urging them to keep people of this section posted on developments. There is quite a bit of hold over wheat in this section and the Chinese situation would form an outlet for it.
