HERE is a question addressed to YOU: Do you or do you not read these daily bulletins that are issued from the bedside of a great man?
If you DO read them, they are NEWS. If you don't read them, they ARE NOT NEWS.

WHAT do you read in your paper? That is the ONE THING that bright and up-to-date editors all over the country want most of all to know.

One authority says that more people are interested in the contents than in anything else. Another thinks the day is past when people will read editorials. Another tells us that foreign news, for which the aggregate vast sums of money are spent, is a waste of space.

WHAT do YOU think about it? YOUR opinion is more important than that anybody else's, because you are the reader, and newspapers are made for their readers. They have to be, because if there were no readers there would be no newspapers.

IN ALL probability, there are things in your newspaper every day that you never read. You wonder, doubtless, why editors are so foolish as to clutter up their papers with these things.

Has this thought occurred to you: Possibly SOMEBODY ELSE reads these things with the keenest interest.

There is an old, old proverb, you know, which says: "One man's meat is another man's poison."

NEWSPAPERS, generally speaking, have to be made for ALL the people. There must be something in them to interest everybody. So, when you run across something YOU don't care for, skip it. It is put there for somebody else.

"ONE man's meat is another man's poison." Senator Smoot, for example, who was quite sure that the lumber industry SHOULDNT have tariff protection.

Rabies Take Toll of Livestock In Harney County; Mad Coyotes Invade Ranches and Attack Dogs

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
PORTLAND, Ore., March 7.—Elmer Williams, assistant predatory animal control leader of the United States biological survey, who returned yesterday from a two weeks' survey of conditions in eastern Oregon, said that a sudden outbreak of rabies, declared worst since 1915-16 when \$1,000,000 worth of cattle died, is raging in Harney county.

Williams said 52 head of cattle had perished yesterday and four rabid coyotes and two infected dogs had been killed by ranchers. George Whiting, rancher living near Burns, was attacked by a crazed coyote February 12, when the animal raced into his front yard. The mad creature bit a hard dig and turned towards the rancher, who managed to kill it with a heavy plank.

Henry Bush, a rancher living near Laveen, had a similar experience a short time afterwards. Williams said, when a second coyote attacked his dog in the front yard, Bush killed the animal with a rifle.

Williams said the entire valley of Harney county had been placed under rigid quarantine and all dogs which have not been vaccinated with the Pasteur vaccine have been placed in captivity. James Lewis and Ross Dollar

Reward of \$1,000 Posted for Murderer of George M. Hess

A reward in the sum of \$1,000 for the capture of the murderer of George M. Hess, killed May 4 last year, was posted by the county court today, following out the recommendation made at the last session of the grand jury. This case has been under investigation since the crime was committed, and all possible witnesses were examined before the last grand jury, but with no new information being obtained.

The grand jury, in its report, filed during the February term of circuit court, recommended that the county court post a suitable reward as it was thought that this might bring out some evidence not heretofore uncovered.

The reward, according to the county court's order, is for the apprehension and delivery to the sheriff of Douglas county, Oregon, of the body of the murderer of George M. Hess.

This peculiar wording follows the requirements of the state law, which is very complicated in its application to posting of rewards by counties.

According to District Attorney Cordon the law requires that a reward be paid for the "body" of the murderer, and, therefore, means that the reward will be paid for capture dead or alive. In the event information is furnished which leads to his capture by the sheriff, the persons giving the information are entitled to the reward, as the sheriff, being a salaried county officer, is not permitted to share in the reward.

If the information comes from one person, then that person is entitled to the full reward, but if more than one person is concerned in the capture then the reward is to be divided among them in proportion to their participation. Suitable reward placards are to be distributed throughout the county by Sheriff Jackson.

NORBLAD DENIES
GAME BODY CLEANUP

PORTLAND, Ore., March 7.—A signed article in the Oregonian today said that Governor A. W. Norblad had made no promise to "clean house" in the state game commission, despite reports to the contrary, nor has the governor seen affidavits against Harold Clifford, state game warden.

The article, obtained from Governor Norblad while he was in the city yesterday said that the governor "acknowledges that the sportsmen will never be satisfied no matter who is game warden or who sits on the game commission." The article quoted the governor as saying: "I'm tired of seeing fish and game made the football of politics. I would rather that the governor did not have the appointing of the game commission. In my message to the legislature in 1921 I intend suggesting a plan which will relieve the governor of continual embarrassment of disagreements among sportsmen. It is not fair to the governor. It would be better if the game commission were appointed by the board of control."

"We have a legislative interim committee of fish and they are expected to make a report to the 1931 session. This committee may work out a solution. We should at least give it a chance," the Oregonian said.

BABE RUTH REFUSES
COMPROMISE OFFER

PETERSBURG, Fla., March 7.—The first salary conference today between Babe Ruth and Colonel Jacob Ruppert, owner of the Yankees, failed when the home run king rejected a compromise offer of \$5,000 for 1930 or \$50,000 for each of the next two seasons. Ruth demands \$55,000 annually for the next three years.

LIQUOR BUYER NOT
GUILTY, JUDGE RULES

MISSING AIRPLANE.
DEAD CREW FOUND

LOS ANGELES, March 7.—A searching party today reached the scene of the wreck of the Western Air express transport in the San Bernardino mountains. A cowboy pilot, circling the canyon where Jimmy Doherty and two companions lost their lives thirteen days ago in a storm, saw the wreckage.

The wrecked plane was located yesterday by Mrs. Josephine Burns and Dudley Steele, neighbors who also recovered the bodies of its crew.

NOMINATIONS
UP TO VOTERS
ON MAY 16TH

Tickets to Be Selected at
Primary for National,
State, County and
Precinct Jobs.

L. B. Sandblast May Oppose
McNary; Coshaw to Run;
Clough to Quit as
Commissioner.

Nine national and state officers, one county officer and a number of district and precinct officers will be voted upon by the voters of Douglas county at the primary election held May 16.

National committeemen are to be elected at that time, and precinct committeemen will be selected in each of the precincts of the county. Other officers are to be nominated. The term of C. L. McNary as U. S. senator expires January 1, 1931, and nominations are to be received for that office. Political observers are expecting L. B. Sandblast, a former resident of Roseburg and avowed "wet," to enter the race against McNary.

W. C. Hawley is to be a candidate for re-nomination for congressman from the first district. So far no opponent has entered the contest.

There is a great deal of interest in the nomination for governor with Governor A. W. Norblad of Astoria, Harry L. Corbett of Portland, and Charles Hall of Marshfield leading the republican nomination. Ed Bailey of Junction City is expected to be a candidate for the democratic nomination, and Bert Hanson of Portland is also being mentioned as a prospective candidate.

Two justices of the supreme court are to be elected, as the terms of Judge O. P. Coshaw and Judge Harry H. Belt are expiring. Both are expected to be candidates for re-election.

Nominations are also to be made for superintendent of public instruction, which office is now filled by C. A. Howard, and commissioner of the bureau of labor, now held by C. H. Gram. The latter has already announced his candidacy for another term.

Two representatives to the state legislature from Douglas county are to be nominated. Walter H. Fisher and Charles A. Lockwood are now serving in that capacity. Both are expected to be candidates again although they state they have not yet definitely decided to enter the race, but will announce their decisions in the near future.

One county commissioner is to be chosen, as the term of Thuron Clough of Canyonville is expiring. Mr. Clough states that he will not be a candidate.

Sheriff Hens said that Emmett sought employment in the isolated region because of family troubles. Mrs. Emmett is alleged to have entered the Eden Ridge section and while Emmett slept attacked him. The sheriff said Mrs. Emmett intended ending her own life, according to a note which was found. She was charged with assault with attempt to kill.

ERLANGER, VETERAN
THEATRE MAN, DIES

NEW YORK, March 7.—A. L. Erlanger, 70, theatrical manager, died today at his home in New York.

Mr. Erlanger was president of the famous old theatrical firm of Klaw and Erlanger and was called the "Napoleon of the stage." He was credited as being the first man to put theatricals on a sound business basis.

LAW BEGINS
TO DEAL WITH
COMMUNISTS

Five Leaders of New York
Demonstrators Held to
Answer Charges of
Inciting Riot.

Girl Who Led Disturbance
in Washington Also to
Answer—Hoover to
Make Statement.

NEW YORK, March 7.—Refusing to answer all important questions, five communist leaders, alleged instigators of yesterday's riots in Union square in which more than 100 persons were injured, were paraded before 200 detectives in the lineup at police headquarters today after a night in jail.

The five leaders were held by the court without bail for a hearing Monday on charges of inciting to riot, a felony. Additional charges of second degree assault also may be filed against them, it was stated.

The maximum penalty for inciting to riot is one year in jail and a fine of \$500.

Girl Leader Accused
WASHINGTON, March 7.—Edith Brisbane, 19-year-old leader of the Junior Communist league here, was held under \$500 bond today after pleading not guilty in police court to a charge of assaulting a police officer during the demonstration yesterday in front of the white house and union advice of her attorney, demanded a jury trial.

Miss Brisbane was the first of seven communists arrested yesterday to appear before Judge Isaac Hill in court this morning.

The other six sat in a corner of the courtroom awaiting their turn to be called, meanwhile displaying newspaper telling of their arrest. Nearly 50 members of the communist group accompanied them to the court but they made no demonstration as they filed quietly into the room.

A second charge of assault, which had been placed against Miss Brisbane after a disturbance this morning in the police station where she was held, was dropped.

Hoover to Act
WASHINGTON, March 7.—President Hoover is expected to make a statement on business and unemployment conditions at his press conference today, with Washington correspondents.

The chief executive conferred today with Secretaries Lanoet of the commerce department and Davis of the labor department.

With the cabinet officers and the president were Dr. Julius Klein, assistant secretary of commerce in charge of foreign commerce and statistics and Frank L. Jones, chief of the United States employment bureau.

FLAGMAN KILLED
IN RAILWAY CRASH

COLUMBUS, Ga., March 7.—Ole E. White, of Phoenix City, Ala., a railway flagman, was killed here today as the second section of the northbound Seminole limited of the Georgia Central railway passenger train, crashed into the rear of the first section, which had halted.

Railway officials were without information as to the number of injured, pending return of a relief train dispatched to the scene of the wreck.

SCHACHT OUTHS OVER
WAR DEBT CHARGE
(Associated Press Leased Wire)
BETHLEHEM, March 7.—Dr. Hissner Schacht, president of the Reich bank, today announced his intention of resigning from his post.

The resignation was understood to be due to his personal interpretation of the final protocol reached at the second Hague conference on reparations, which he claimed made changes in the original Young plan such as to endanger its success.

While Dr. Schacht will not discuss his announcement, members of his staff told the Associated Press he was so convinced the second Hague conference departed from the Young plan which he believed to draft that he could not assume responsibility for its execution.

NEEDY CHINA GETS NO WHEAT UNLESS CONGRESS ORDERS

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Chairman Ledge took the position today that the farm board was not a charitable institution and that congress would have to guarantee the expenditure if it adopted the McMaster resolution proposing that the board buy \$25,000,000 worth of wheat and send it to China to relieve famine.

"We've got the wheat if they want it," he said, "but we are not the Red Cross and if congress wants to be charitable that's up to congress."

The resolution was introduced by Senator McMaster, republican, South Dakota, for the two-fold purpose of finding an outlet for surplus American wheat and bringing relief to the famine area of Indo-China. He proposed that the Chinese national government guarantee the repayment of the \$25,000,000 within 10 years.

Further consideration of the resolution was postponed until next week by the senate agriculture committee when it expects to hear the testimony of D. O. Lively of New York, national director of China famine relief, which active urged adoption. The committee heard objections to the resolution yesterday from John Barton Payne, chairman of the American Red Cross, and John Van A. MacMurtrey, former minister to China.

ARMORED RUM BOAT
TAKEN; MAN DYING
(Associated Press Leased Wire)
LORAIN, O., March 7.—A man who said he was Fred Hentrie, Detroit, probably was fatally wounded and an unidentified companion was captured by coast guardsmen who fired on an armored tug midway between Lorain and Cleveland early today. The tug carried a cargo of 1,000 cases of liquor, the guardsmen said.

Captain J. T. Hagrove of the coast guard boat said the tug failed to heed his orders to halt and turned about in a clumsy effort to escape after two warning shots were fired. Captain Hagrove ordered his crew of eight men to fire directly with a one-pounder and rifles.

Hentrie was found with two bullet wounds in his back and hospital attendants said he probably would die. The other prisoner, Hagrove said, was "too drunk to give his name."

The captured tug was the "Samuel G" of Port Stanley, Ont., coast guardsmen said. It is 65 feet long and powered with a large gasoline motor.

The prospective armor consisted of sheets of five-eighths inch steel fastened almost entirely around the hull, nearly to the water line, and around the engine room and pilot house walls.

WIFE OF FAMOUS
ARTIST MURDERED

BUFFALO, N. Y., March 7.—Arrested in the brutal slaying of Mrs. Henri Marchand, wife of the famous artist and curator of the Buffalo museum of science, an Indian woman alleged to have been infatuated with the artist today blamed the killing on an older woman of her tribe.

Police detectives said Miss Lilian Jimerson, 35, full blood Indian whom Mr. Marchand had used as a model, admitted she was present in the Marchand home yesterday when Mrs. Marchand was beaten and choked to death, but maintained she did not kill her. Police did not make public the name of the woman she accused, who also is under arrest.

Before arresting Mrs. Marchand on the head with a heavy instrument, fracturing her skull, the killer had stuffed into her mouth a chloroform-soaked rag of paper, tied together with thread.

INDIAN VALLEY R. R.
OPPOSES MERGER
(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, March 7.—Opposition to the proposed construction by the Western Pacific and the Great Northern railroads of a Pacific coast connection between their lines was expressed today by the Indian Valley railroad in a brief filed with the interstate commerce commission.

The Indian Valley contended such construction lowers its freight volume and that it was a pioneer in the territory involved; that it was ready to extend its system wherever the needs of the region may require; and that there is no existing need for additional service in that territory.

The Indian Valley pointed out that it holds a unique position among railroads of the United States in that it has no debts, either bonded or otherwise, that it discounts its monthly bills, has a surplus of \$216,000 and over \$50,000 in the savings bank earning interest.

FOUR KILLED, HEAVY LOSS IN PROPERTY

Arkansas, Mississippi,
Louisiana Lashed;
Injured Number
Over Forty.

Village of Gregory Wiped
Out, Many Structures
Elsewhere Razed,
Wires Down.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
MEMPHIS, Tenn., March 7.—Four deaths and property damage, estimated by owners at more than \$100,000, were chargeable today to a tornado, which lashed Mississippi, Arkansas and Louisiana last night, wrecking a village of 200 and injuring two score.

Tearing through Mississippi plantations and small towns the high wind killed two negroes in Bolivar county. Injured ten persons and destroyed fifteen houses valued at \$20,000. Mrs. J. W. Adams, 65, was killed and two negro employees hurt as the storm swept the Adams farm near Kosciusko, Miss.

Heading into Arkansas the tornado virtually wiped out the village of Gregory with damage estimated by John Eldridge, plantation owner, at \$30,000. Later the storm dipped into the Harris community, about eight miles from Homer, La., killed a negro woman named Mitchell and injured three others. Five tenant houses, a residence and a church were demolished.

Town Evacuated
Residents of Boyle, Miss., were warned of the approach of the storm and fled their homes, but ten persons in the neighborhood were struck by flying debris.

The Rev. H. R. McKee of Boyle, standing on the porch of his home watching a heavy rain cloud, said he saw the tornado come over the village of Skene, three miles away. Telephone and telegraph wires were torn down throughout the area.

Farm Area Flooded
VERMILION, S. D., March 7.—An ice gorge in the Missouri river today was reported to have caused the waters to inundate thousands of acres of farm lands. Families were moved to highlands. Several families were moved from their homes by boat. The flooded area was between Burbank and Vermilion.

DR. WILLIAM HOUSE DIES IN 56TH YEAR

PORTLAND, Ore., March 7.—Dr. William House, 56, prominent alienist and neurologist, died at his residence here last night. He had been ill since November.

He was well known in Pacific coast medical services, having served in 1912 and 1913 as president of the Portland city and county medical society and in 1923 as president of the Portland academy of medicine.

He was a professor of medical jurisprudence at the medical school of the University of Oregon from 1908 to 1926 and in 1929 he also served as associate professor of nervous and mental diseases of the school.

For the past ten years he had been associate editor of the North-west Medicine, medical magazine.

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
