Boy Scouts Get Honor Badges at Local Meeting

Eight Rewarded for Work Worthy of Recognition; I. O. O. F. Sponsoring New Troop.

Eight scouts received second class awards and twenty-four merit badges were also awarded at the Boy Scout court of honor held at the city hall last night. Judge C. K. Quinn, Dr. G. C. Finlay, Guy Cordon, Barton Bellwell, C. E. Rannin, Rev. J. B. Penhall and Wm. Blake made up the personnel of the court.

Those who received second class badges are Don Parton and Darrell Cordon of troop 3; Douglas Short, Ben Carnahan, Bernard Torrey and Jack Barthel of troop 2; Barton Brown and Bob Walker of troop 6. Merit badges were awarded as follows: John Brough, troop 2, first aid, carpentry, first aid to animals, personal health; George Brough, troop 3, scholarship, first aid, first aid to animals and personal health; Edw. McDowell, troop 3, woodwork; Paul McGowan, troop 3, personal health, first aid, carpentry and first aid to animals; Dale Owen, troop 3, first aid to animals; Bruce Owen, troop 3, first aid to animals; Robert Snaucke, troop 6, woodwork; Leland Russell, troop 6, pathfinder; Clark Leedy, troop 6, carpentry and music; Duane Cooper, troop 25 of Sutherland, public health, gardening, agriculture, cycling and personal health.

Though all these scouts had previously been examined before appearing before the court of honor, they were questioned, as a matter of interest as well as for examination, and their answers brought out many interesting facts and showed that all who received awards were proficient. Those who passed first aid are ready to serve in any emergency to make injured people comfortable. Likewise those who received awards in woodwork and carpentry know how to use a great deal of their own making things of wood. They enjoy creative things from their own imaginative powers. Those who have been awarded public health certificates know about the transmission of many diseases and will do their best to help prevent that transmission. One thing sure, they will never be guilty of anything in public places and on sidewalks. Some showed proficiency in caring for their personal health, in the study of music, in canning, cooking, thrift, compass work, firebuilding, care and use of the knife and axe and other things which will be of great help in the making of men.

The next court of honor will be held Tuesday, March 25. The scouts will be working hard for the adult attendance at that meeting as they will receive 100 points for each adult present.

New Troop Meets—The new troop of scouts being sponsored by Union encampment No. 2, I. O. O. F., held a supper meeting at the lodge hall last night preceding the court of honor meeting for scouts.

The executive attended the supper which was "patook" and as soon as the boys had had their "dinner" he presented them with membership certificates. A. J. 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FIGUREHEAD BANK DIRECTORS SCORE

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The speaker outlined three specific reasons for the inactivity of those who constitute the board of directors of the bank. He said the inconvenience and loss of time in attendance at meetings, the fear of offending the active officers of the bank in taking the initiative in any administrative program and a desire on the part of the active officers to assume all of the responsibility and arrogate to themselves all the credit for the success of the institutions were the three reasons.

"No man, whether he be president of an institution large or small," Agnew said, "who permits his vanity to reach a point where he repulses the cooperation of directors in order to gather to himself larger degrees of power and possibly credit for the success of the bank, is fit for the job."

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
