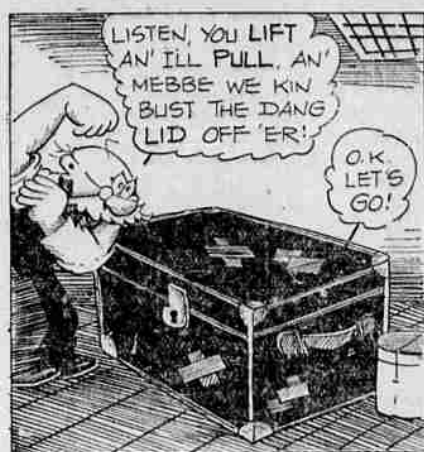

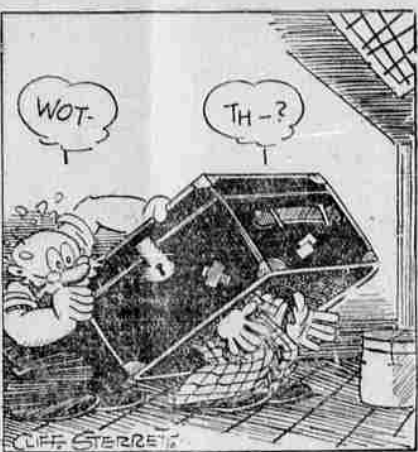

TAKING THE POISON OUT OF LIFE

The most deadly thing about an automobile, the poisonous carbon monoxide gas in its exhaust, is deadly no longer. Its fangs have been pulled by Professor Frazer of Johns Hopkins.

Professor Frazer's device, which will take the place of the usual muffler, sets simply by feeding more oxygen to the monoxide, turning it into harmless dioxide—the familiar "carbonic acid gas" of the soda-water fountain. We read in the Science News Letter (Washington), a science service publication:

"Since carbon monoxide, odorless, colorless, tasteless, and poisonous, swiftly in small concentrations, claims many lives each month through the careless use of automobiles failing to open garage doors before warming up their engines, this latest chemical achievement is hailed as an important step in making the machine age less dangerous."

"Dr. Frazer declared today that an automobile equipped with the new oxidizing device could be run in a closed garage without danger from carbon monoxide poisoning."

For a year and a half, it seems, Dr. Frazer worked to develop the new catalyst that will add oxygen to carbon monoxide, even when in direct contact with hot, moist air. Laboratory tests and thousands of miles of road-testing convinced him that a catalyst substituted for a regulation muffler will not only deaden the noise of the engine explosions but remove all the unburned fuel gases in the exhaust, the ill-smelling ones as well as the deadly carbon monoxide. —The Literary Digest, Feb. 15, 1930.

Know Your State



Oregon's 1929 Wheat Crop Worth Over 25 Million; 23 Bushels Per Acre is Average For State.

On river bottom lands near Scappoose in 1929 wheat yielded over 95 bushels per acre. The state average last year was 23 bushels per acre. These figures have aroused great interest in eastern states where averages have dropped to 17, 15 and even 10 bushels per acre. Umatilla county produces about one per cent of the nation's wheat supply, 6,000, 000 bushels, enough to feed all Oregon. The entire production of the 11 western states is just a trifle more than is needed to supply the population; in a few years, production and consumption will balance. A Yamhill county in 1929 chamber of commerce officials measured numerous wheat fields and, after threshing, the yields averaged from 38 to 70 bushels per acre. In the big wheat areas of central and eastern Oregon, tractor-combines harvest 60 acres in 16 hours. Small combines are now used in western and southern Oregon. The old threshing season of 100 days, with thousands of itinerant workers coming in the fields and with threshing machines, has given away to a short season of from 10 to 20 days with local labor doing all the work. Elevators and railroads, however, are pushed to the limit to handle the deluge of grain. Grain lands in eastern Oregon range in price from \$25 per acre to \$150, depending upon yields, improvements and location. In western Oregon wheat is raised as one crop of a diversified program, lands selling from \$40 to \$150 per acre, with a
