

## Championship of Basketball League at Stake Tonight

### ROSEBURG QUINTET FACES NORTH BEND IN DECIDING GAME

Each of High School Fives  
Defeated Only Once So  
Far; Locals Dropped  
13th Contest.

Final Struggle to Be Over  
Before 8:30 to Permit  
Attendance Also at  
Fashion Revue.

Closing a season in which they played 13 games and suffered only one defeat, the Roseburg senior high school basketball team meets the North Bend high school tonight in a game that will decide the championship of the Southwestern Oregon A. League. The game will be played at the Roseburg senior high school gymnasium. The record made by the team this year stands out as one of the best turned in by a local high school team in many years. The only game lost during the season was in the match with Coquille March 1.

Although he claims he is not superstitious, Coach Hod Turner says that the next time he plays the thirteenth game of the season he will not make Dan Entler captain, for the flashy Roseburg guard always carries the number "13" on his jersey, and as the Coquille game was the thirteenth contest and Entler was captain, Turner is of the opinion that it was pressing the jinx too far.

North Bend, Roseburg's opponent in tonight's contest, likewise has only one defeat, that having been administered by Roseburg at North Bend early in the season. This leaves the two teams tied for the championship of the district and tonight's game is the one that will determine the title.

Due to the fact that the basketball game has reached its crucial point in the very last game, there is a great deal of interest being shown throughout the entire district, and a great many Cone county fans are expected to be on hand for the contest, as well as a huge number of Roseburg supporters.

**No Clash With Style Show**  
Coach Turner states that the game will start exactly at 7:30 o'clock and will be rushed through as rapidly as possible, so that there will be no conflict with the fashion show at the Antlers theatre. The game will easily be completed before 8:30 o'clock, giving ample time for the fans to get to the theatre in time for the fashion show, which does not start until after 9 o'clock. The motion picture feature will be run through for a second showing after the nature of the region thereby giving everyone a chance to see both events.

Because of the decisive character of tonight's game, Coach Turner has secured the services of Roy Lamb as referee. Mr. Lamb is freshman basketball coach at Oregon State college, and is considered one of the best referees in the state. He is also to officiate for the county tournament to be played Saturday.

Roseburg's string of victories for the season shows the team to be formidable, and well deserving of the place that it occupies in the

The Spartans of Spokane will clash with Green Lake of Seattle in the other championship contest while Everett Y. M. C. A. will meet the Multnomah A. C. of Portland and the Olympia Ramblers will tackle Ellensburg-Yakima. In the two consolation games for a chance at third place.

The winners of the two championship battles meet next tomorrow night for the northwest independent title.

### JUSTICES COSHOW AND BELT TO RUN FOR RE-ELECTION

SALEM, Ore., March 7.—Justice Harry H. Belt of the supreme court has filed with the secretary of state his declaration as a candidate for re-nomination at the republican primary election.

Under a change in the manner of electing justices, made by the 1923 legislature, whereby a candidate seeks a particular position on the court, Justice Belt is a candidate for position No. 6. Under the old system, with, for example, two places to fill by election, the two receiving the largest number of votes were declared nominated or elected.

Chief Justice O. P. Coshow's term expires this year also. Coshow is a democrat, and will file, probably today, as a candidate for re-election.

Belt was first elected to the supreme court in 1924, beginning his term in January, 1925. Justice John McCourt had died and Judge M. L. Pipes of Portland was appointed by Governor Pierce to succeed him. Pipes was not a candidate in the following election and Belt was elected. Since the term of office is six years this is the first year Belt has been up for re-election.

Coshow was appointed by Governor Pierce in January, 1924, to succeed Justice L. T. Harris, who resigned. Coshow was then elected in November of that year. Like Belt, this is his first time up for re-election.

**NEWCOMERS PLAN  
TO IMPROVE RANCH**  
Mr. and Mrs. Abner H. Marsh, of Seattle, who recently purchased a 40-acre subdivision of the old Lee Love ranch bordering on the North Fork of the Willamette river, returned to Roseburg Thursday and are busy planning for the improvement of the place. The property is one of the finest bordering the river, having approximately 25 acres of river bottom land, the balance being on the hill slope. Mr. Marsh has contracted with the Moyer nursery of Tillamook for a sufficient number of Barlett and Rose pear trees to plant the river land, and will also put out some filberts on the up-

land. He has selected a building site on a commanding elevation overlooking the river, where he expects to eventually erect a bungalow in keeping with the beautiful surroundings. At present he will have all the small brush along the river cut out, saving the larger willows, cottonwoods, birches and alder, so that the view from the building site will be unobstructed. A man has been engaged for this work, and to look after the property. The entire tract will be cultivated this spring and summer, and the young orchard planted this coming fall.

### FOUR UTILITIES DUE FOR INQUIRY

The issues are the electric industrial power rates of the Northwest Electric company at Rainier, only, the industrial power and lighting rates of the Yamhill Electric company at Newberg, the Young Electric company at Wilsonville, and the Molalla Electric company at Molalla.

### SALEM TEACHERS WILL VOTE ON NEW SALARY PROPOSAL

SALEM, Ore., March 7.—The salaries of 49 Salem teachers would be reduced and 77 increased under a proposed new schedule prepared by a committee of teachers which will be voted on by all the teachers of the city within a week.

The total that is now paid the teachers would not be increased, and adjustment is on a 12-month basis. Classification would take into consideration preparation and experience. Normal school graduates would receive \$960 the first year, \$1020 the second, \$1080 the third, \$1140 the fourth and \$1200 the fifth year.

Teachers who have attended college three or four years but who have not acquired degrees would receive \$1020 the first year and \$60 additional each year through the fifth. Those with bachelors' de-

grees would receive \$1080 the first year and \$60 additional yearly through the fifth year.

### MANY FAVORING DRY REFERENDUM
