Roseburg High School Wins League Title

**NORTH BEND
DEFEATED BY
25-19 SCORE**

**Local Basketeers Lead Coos
County Quintet Entire
Game; First Period
Ends 9 to 0.**

**Victors in Deciding Battle
Show Uncanny Accuracy
in Making Points
on Long Shots.**

Roseburg senior high school last night won the basketball championship for Southwestern Oregon League by defeating North Bend 25 to 19 in one of the fastest games ever played in the local gymnasium. Starting off with a rush that had North Bend lagging 9 to 0 at the quarter, Roseburg led the scoring from the start to the finish of the contest, but near the end was playing on a very narrow margin, and Roseburg fans, who composed the largest crowd ever assembled in the senior high school gymnasium for a basketball game, were frantically imploring the Roseburg players for more scores. As the game entered the final minutes, Roseburg responded and halted North Bend's determined rally, and scored another sensational field goal that ended the tallies for the game.

Obediently following the instructions of Coach "Red" Turner, the Roseburg players opened the game with a complete reversal of style. Heretofore the Roseburg team has played a style of game that caused the ball to be worked in close to the basket before an attempt was made for the goal, but in last night's game, the boys started shooting from almost any position on the floor and were successful in converting a great many of their long shots.

Iles Roseburg Star
Garland Iles, playing a wonderful game for Roseburg, flashed into the noise under the basket time and again, to take the ball off the backboard, following a long shot by a teammate, and baited the pickup into the hoop for a score. Roseburg's guarding for the first quarter was airtight, and the North Bend players found it impossible to penetrate into safe shooting area, and were held scoreless during the first quarter.

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TRAGEDY FOLLOWS BASKETBALL GAME

KIRKWOOD, Ill., March 8.—A score of passengers was injured, one perhaps fatally and seven others severely, when two buses carrying players and fans back to Galesburg from a basketball tournament at Burlington, Ill., crashed and burned near here early today.

When the leading bus failed to make a turn one mile south of here and careened wildly, the trailing conveyance crashed into it. The gasoline tank of the latter was broken and the fuel burst into flames.

The fire spread quickly and many of the occupants of both buses were burned before they could get out. Others suffered broken limbs, cuts and bruises.

William Tucker, of Galesburg, with severe burns and other injuries, was in a critical condition in a Monmouth hospital.

Justice Holmes, Oldest Man Ever On U.S. Supreme Bench, Reaches 89

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The eighty-ninth birthday of Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes was celebrated in the senate today which listened to a tribute delivered a short time before the members of the supreme court gathered in the conference chamber of the highest tribunal to extend personal greetings to the veteran jurist.

Recalling that the 27 years of service by Justice Holmes set a record for the supreme court, Senator Thomas J. Walsh referred to the justice as "one of the noblest and most patriotic members of the American judiciary."

"Few men have been spared to give so many years of service to the nation," he added, explaining Holmes had been on the highest courts of Massachusetts and on the supreme court of the United States for a total of 47 years.

Mrs. Holmes died only a few months ago and anniversaries now do not call for celebration.

Even before he took the oath, Justice Holmes was known to the legal profession as a master of jurisprudence and his work "The Common Law" published in 1881 is still regarded as a classic. The principles he laid down there have been consistently followed by him on the bench. Known for his dissenting opinions in appeals to the views of his more conservative colleagues, his mastery setting forth of his conclusions have earned for him the title "The Great Dissenter."

Son of Oliver Wendell Holmes, known to every school boy as the author of "The One Hoss Shay" and "Old Ironsides," Justice Holmes is the oldest man ever to serve on the supreme bench.

He is a veteran of the Civil war and was wounded at the battle of Ball's Bluff.

ROSEBURG ADVISED TO SHIP VIA COOS

On a mission to interest Roseburg and Douglas county shippers in shipping by boat to Coos Bay, thence by truck to this territory, the local chamber of commerce, through the Coos Bay port, F. E. Lewis, president of the Marshfield chamber of commerce, and Andy Davis, secretary of that organization, spent several hours in Roseburg yesterday. As many of the directors of the Roseburg chamber of commerce are located at the local level, together with A. C. Marsters and J. E. McClintock, gathered for luncheon. The Marshfield men presented facts and figures tending to support their contention that freight could be shipped from San Francisco to Roseburg via Coos Bay cheaper than by rail direct. They said they saw in good and the water motor truck delivery has the added advantage of making its delivery at the door of the recipient of the shipment. This method of shipping was shown to be particularly advantageous for less than carload shipments.

The whole subject of freight rates affecting this section came under discussion and Frank Norton and A. C. Marsters, who are both active in the Western Oregon traffic association, told of the effective work of that organization. It was shown that through the efforts of the association savings running into thousands of dollars have been made. Mr. Norton pointed out that the fundamental need of this region is the establishment of the port of Coos Bay as an official port of entry and a designated port to be considered when making rates on shipping to intermediate Pacific coast points.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 8.—Recall petition passers were joined on downtown streets today by anti-cigarette bakers when a handful of professional women petition solicitors circulated through the market shopping grounds seeking 400 names to complete the number declared necessary to file the proposed initiative against cigarettes for the November election.

The workers said they had been employed by George Rylander, professional petition passer, at the request of the Anti-Cigarette League of Oregon, Inc.

While these women sought supporters of the anti-cigarette movement, other petition passers sought more names to the petitioners seeking the removal of the entire city administration.

The anti-cigarette petitioners said the movement was started because "too many women and children are smoking."

EX-PORTLAND COP ACCUSED OF THEFT

PORTLAND, Ore., March 8.—Police were seeking a former brother officer today to charge him with grand larceny in connection with the theft of \$160 and wearing apparel from Joe Farrinheimer, a roomer in a hotel.

Letter Gives Abe Lincoln's Tariff Views

PHILADELPHIA, March 8.—The Philadelphia Evening Bulletin today prints what is purported to be an unpublished letter by Abraham Lincoln giving his views on the tariff question in 1855.

The letter was written on the stationery of the "office of the circuit clerk and recorder of DeWitt county, Illinois," and was dated "Clinton, October 11, 1855." In some instances dashes were used instead of punctuation. It reads, in part:

"I was an old Henry Clay tariff while in old times I made more speeches on that subject than on any other. I have not since changed my views—I believe yet, if we could have a moderate, carefully adjusted, protective tariff, so far as acquired in, as not to be a perpetual subject of political strife, squabbles, changes and uncertainties, it would be better for us. Still, it is my opinion that, just now the revival of that question will not advance the cause itself, or the man who revives it—I have not thought much upon the subject recently, but my general impression is, that the necessity for a protective tariff will, ere long, force its old opponents to take it up; and then its old friends can join in, and establish it on a more firm and durable basis. We, the old whigs, have been entirely beaten out on the tariff question; and we shall not be able to re-establish the policy, until the absence of it, shall have demonstrated the necessity for it, in the minds of men hereafter, opposed to it."

With this view, I should prefer to not now write a public letter upon the subject."

GEO. JOSEPH MAY RUN FOR GOVERNOR

PORTLAND, Ore., March 8.—The Telegram said today that another prospective gubernatorial candidate in the person of George W. Joseph, Portland lawyer and member of the state senate from Multnomah county for six legislative sessions, loomed on the political horizon.

The newspaper said in part: "A movement to draft the former Multnomah county solon was precipitated Wednesday following an announcement from Salem on the previous day that the three referees appointed by the Oregon supreme court in the Joseph-Mazamotte case, had recommended his disbarment for life on account of criticisms of the supreme court."

"It began," the newspaper continued, "with the insistent demands of a few friends and political admirers that he become a candidate to vindicate himself and since then the movement has spread with such rapidity that it has become a veritable boom."

While Joseph continues non-committal, the possibility that he may yield to the pressure and hurl his hat into the ring has in turn led to speculation upon just what issues he would predicate his candidacy, the newspaper said.

**Police Raid Lair
OF BOMBING GANG**

CHICAGO, March 8.—Eleven men were arrested and two bombs, four shotguns and several pistols seized in a raid last night on a farm near Melrose park which police said was headquarters for a "bomb trust."

The raiders said they had positive information that the gang had supplied a number of bombs that have shaken Chicago recently. Two powerful dynamite bombs, wrapped and apparently ready for delivery, were found in a secret cupboard in the kitchen.

The raiding party was led by Joseph Altemeyer, bomb expert of the state's attorney's office, who said the prisoners had reorganized the bomb trust that was crushed by a sensational raid a year ago.

BLAZE AT DULUTH FATAL TO 4 PERSONS

LIFE LOSS IN FRENCH FLOOD EXCEEDS 500

**Property Ruin Will Reach
Many Millions—Mills
Swept Away, Power
Plants Stilled.**

**Thousands of Families Are
Homeless; Government
Agencies Give Aid
to Destitute.**

TOULOUSE, France, March 8.—Stimulated rather than discouraged by the magnitude of the task which becomes hourly more apparent to them the population of the stricken French regions are setting rapidly and intelligently about the task of repairing damage wrought by the Garonne and its tributaries.

Loss of life in the flood disaster it now appears, will run well over the previous high estimates of 500, with Moissac, where 150 perished, the hardest hit of the towns. Property damage will aggregate many millions of dollars. Thousands are homeless where a week ago was one of the happiest, healthiest sections of southern sunny France.

Rehabilitation Work.
At Montauban, where 10,000 out of 28,000 inhabitants are without shelter, housing was the first problem faced by municipal authorities, who made a rapid survey of damaged houses in the town. Those capable of repair were taken in hand at once by contractors.

By almost superhuman efforts the electrical power plant was put into commission again, but it will be two months before the gas plant can work and there is no drinking water from the central reservoir. Dozens of military engineers from Perpignan and Versailles are on their way to aid in the work of reparation.

At Villeneuve, on the Agout river, rescue workers with provisions, had to detour nearly 21 miles to get from that part of the city on the right bank of the Agout to that part on the left, since not only the big bridge there but also those at Magdeleine, Leyrac and Mirpeux were swept away.

Factories Wiped Out.
In the department of the Tarn the loss of life was light—there were only four dead there—damage to property was immense. Half the department, notably the sections of Lamoignon, Castres and Mazamet, was covered with the flood water. Weaving and spinning mills and leather and dressing factories were swept away and the power plants along the river disabled.

Mazamet alone had an annual turnover of more than a billion francs and the chamber of commerce estimates provisionally the damage at a hundred millions of francs. The work of restoration here will require time as well as money. Thousands of flood victims will be forced to remain in idleness for weeks until factories are rebuilt and reconstructed.

HOOVER ASKS MORE FOR U. S. FARM AID

WASHINGTON, March 8.—President Hoover today asked congress to appropriate \$100,000,000 to be immediately available as a part of the \$500,000,000 revolving fund authorized under the agricultural marketing act.

This sum is in addition to the \$150,000,000 already authorized for the board by congress.

The presidential communication was addressed to Speaker Clegg, worth it said that the time had arrived when further funds were needed by the board.

OIL BARGE BLAST TAKES THREE LIVES

KEARNEY, N. J., March 8.—Three men were believed to have perished last night when five paces by an explosion destroyed a Pure Oil company oil barge moored in the Passaic river.

Another member of the crew escaped when he leaped into the river and swam ashore.

The barge carried 9,500 gallons of gasoline.

PHYSICIAN WARNS VARE NOT TO RUN

PHILADELPHIA, March 8.—Dr. Edward H. Kirby, physician to William S. Vare, republican organization leader of Philadelphia, said today that Mr. Vare must not make the fight for the United States senate.

"The stress of a political campaign would be fatal," he said. "It is known that political friends of Mr. Vare have been trying to induce him to retire as a candidate because of his health, but not one word has come from the Philadelphia leader that he would retire."

Mr. Vare arrived here yesterday from Florida and last night held conference with influential leaders in local organization after which it was reported that he would soon announce his withdrawal as a candidate. After the conference, it was said, Vare had decided to assume leadership of the anti-grundy fight throughout the state and would endorse Secretary of Labor Davis for senator and Francis Shunk Brown for governor.

No formal statement was made on the result of the conference.

AMOS 'N' ANDY PAY VISIT TO HOOVER

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Two of the nation's best known radio entertainers—Amos 'N' Andy—greeted President Hoover today, and were in turn acclaimed by a throng of admirers who pressed against the barricades separating the chief executive's office in the state department building.

Word that the two men, whose real names are Freeman Gosden and Charles J. Correll, were on the white house calling list had spread quickly and among those in the crowd which had gathered was John Marshall Newton, son of the chief executive's administrative secretary.

With twinkling eyes, Amos 'N' Andy gave a brief dialogue for his benefit as well as for the others who had flocked to the executive offices.

JUSTICE COSHOW AGAIN CANDIDATE

END COMES TO JURIST IN 64TH YEAR

**Sudden And Startling
Demise Sequel To
Visit Made To
His Dentist.**

**Attorney General of U. S.
in Roosevelt Cabinet;
League of Nations
Had His Backing.**

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Justice Edward Terry Sanford of the supreme court, died at his home here today. He was 64 years of age.

The news of his death came with startling unexpectedness. "The fact that he was ill became generally known only a few minutes before the word of the end was received."

He was taken ill this morning while visiting his dentist and was rushed to his home. He died a few minutes later.

His colleagues on the supreme bench had gathered in the court conference room and were congratulating Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes on his 89th birthday at about the time he passed away.

The death of Justice Sanford came at a time when his former chief, William Howard Taft, lies critically ill at his home. Word from Mr. Taft's physicians this morning said that the former president was not quite as well as after his recent consecutive service on the bench of the federal district court for middle and eastern Tennessee, Edward Terry Sanford was made associate justice of the supreme court of the United States by President Harding, January 31, 1921. He was chosen to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Justice Pitney, who had been compelled to retire by ill health. His appointment restored the numerical representation of the south on the tribunal as it stood at the time of the death of Chief Justice White—Justice McReynolds, also from Tennessee, being the other member whose home was south of the Mason and Dixon line.

Before entering the federal judiciary Justice Sanford had one year been an assistant attorney general of the United States under President Roosevelt, who appointed him to the bench, and in that capacity had frequently appeared before the supreme court in the argument of cases.

Harvard Graduate
During the Civil war his father, a Connecticut Yankee, went to Tennessee, taking up his residence in Knoxville, where he married Miss Emma Chavannes, whose family was among the pioneers of eastern Tennessee. Justice Sanford was born July 25, 1865, and after preparation in a private school entered the University of Tennessee, from which he was graduated in 1883. At Harvard he
