DEL MONTE, Calif., March 8.—After brilliant exhibitions of marksmanship, four contestants today were the leaders of 200 or more trapshooters in the fourth grand Del Monte hundred and handicap tournament. They were Mark Arlie of Champaign, Ill., and Frank M. Troeh of Portland, who continued in the front rank, and sharing honors with them were E. C. Griffin of Seattle, Wash., and A. Ammann, Chicago.

All four amateurs broke 99x100 in the 16-yard event of yesterday's shooting. However, the outstanding event of the day was the performance of Rush Razez, Denver, Colo., professional, who broke 100 straight for a perfect score.

Today's program included the Grand Del Monte hundred and the doubles championships. Additional marksmen from California points were expected to increase the gathering at the Del Monte gun club. The final event of the tournament, the Grand Del Monte handicap will be held Sunday, the last day of the meet.

ALIMONY OR JAIL UP TO LAFOLLETTE

SALEM, Ore., March 8.—The supreme court has sent to the lower court for Multnomah county a mandate in the case of the state on relation of Mary LaFollette against Charles R. LaFollette, LaFollette, member of the lower house of the state legislature during the past two sessions, from Washington county, was held guilty in the lower court for contempt of court, when he failed to comply with an order that he pay \$75 a month alimony, \$75 costs and \$50 attorney's fees.

took a master of arts degree in 1885, and four years later received his law diploma there, having in the meantime been admitted to practice before the bar of his state.

A republican in politics, Justice Sanford, during the period he practiced law, took an active part in the political affairs of his state, and after going upon the bench never lost interest in the perplexing problems confronting his state and the nation. His economic views tending to the Manchester school of free trade and the development of close international relations, he actively advocated participation by the United States in an association of leagues of nations, becoming a lieutenant under Chief Justice Taft in his fight for a league to enforce peace.

On February 6, 1919 Justice Sanford married Miss Lottie Mallor Woodruff of Knoxville.
