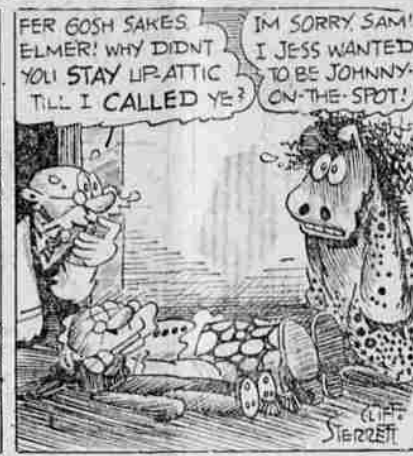
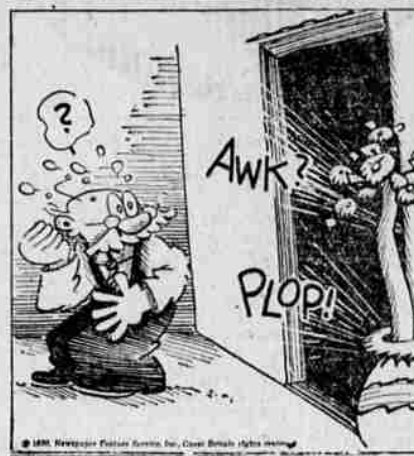
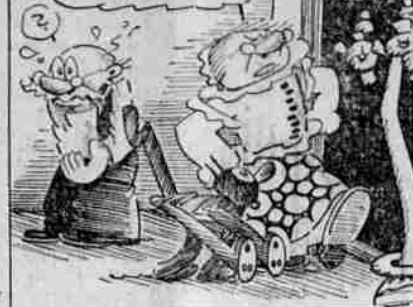

LET YOUR LIGHT SHINE

Forty mountaineer children from the region in the vicinity of President Hoover's camp in Madison County, Va., assembled Feb. 19 in a new schoolhouse, to be taught by a young woman from the Kentucky mountains, Miss Christine Vest, recently a teacher in the Berea college training school.

This has come about because of the interest of President and Mrs. Hoover in their neighbors, especially the youthful members of the community. One of these, William McKinley ("Ray") Burraker, brought President Hoover a possum on his birthday. Mr. Hoover appreciated the gift and had a talk with the young mountaineer, giving him a piece of his birthday cake.

"Ray" had never heard of Lindbergh or of many happenings in the outside world, but he knew the mountains and could sing songs of the mountaineers. He showed that President Hoover was right when he said with the "possum," and called again with two more possums, for which he received \$10. At the request of the president, the boy's father called at the camp and discussed conditions in the community. Mr. Hoover agreed to find funds for a new schoolhouse if Mr. Burraker and his friends would see to it that the state provided a salary and expenses for the teacher. The only other school in that region is eight miles away, across the mountains, and rough roads and trails make it difficult for the children to attend.—News story from Shenandoah, Virginia, February 11th, 1929.

Know Your State



Dairy Products Worth Over 25 Million a Year; Six World Records Held By Oregon Jerseys.

Oregon has often advertised that it offers proof of superior dairying advantages. Its proof is found in the number of butter fat production records established by the dairy animals of the state and the number of medals won by its sires. On one Oregon farm at the present time near Independence, are four Jersey cows which have each produced over 1,000 pounds of butter fat in a year. Oregon Jersey cattle hold six of sixteen world records established in that breed. Many animals of other breeds owned in Oregon have established records.

At the 1929 Pacific International Livestock show the first three awards for butter were won by Oregon dairy people. The lower Columbia River creamery association took practically all the prizes for butter at the 1929 Pacific Slope dairy show at Oakland, California. Oregon has approximately 220,000 dairy animals which in 1929 produced in new wealth about \$25,000,000. Practically every section of the state offers excellent opportunities in dairying. In eastern Oregon alfalfa hay can be produced at extremely low costs and marketing facilities are good. Central Oregon produces fine clovers and alfalfa and dairying has developed in splendid style. In southern Oregon and in the Willamette valley dairy herds have brought in steady monthly incomes. Along the coast sections of Oregon grass is green for 10 and 11 months of the year. Tillamook county is famous for its cheese. The dairy industry has been used as the subject matter for one of the state chamber's poster stamps now being used to nationally advertise this industry to the world.
