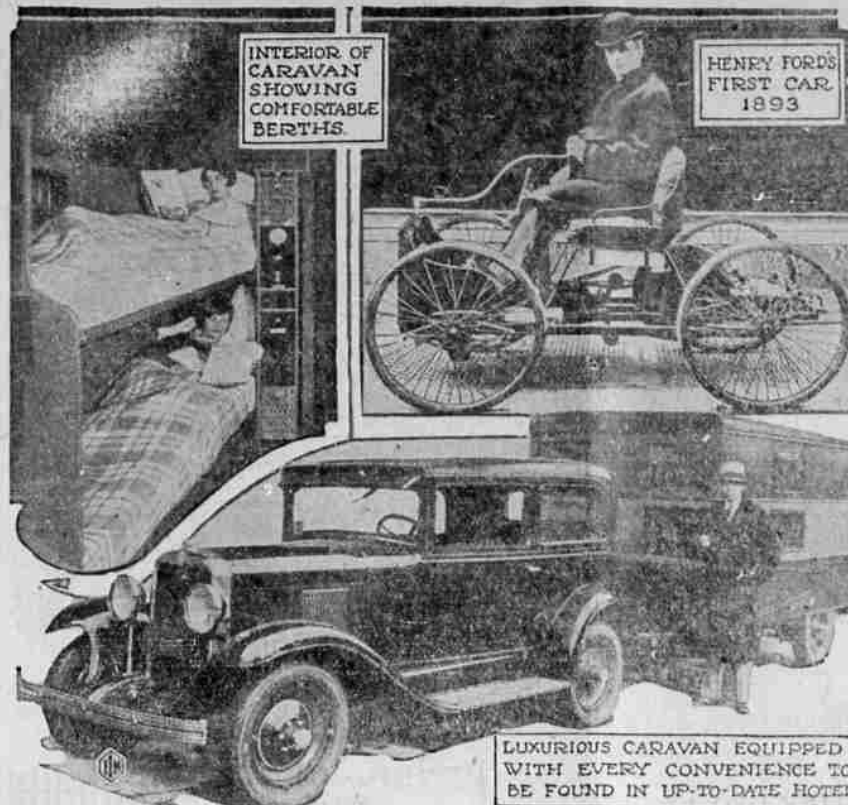

The trailer is equipped with four berths, running water, electric lights, and special ventilation apparatus. In fact, it has all the comforts of an up-to-date hotel room. This hotel room on wheels is no wider than an ordinary car, yet the berths used are quite slumber-inducing. Of course, there's a trick to it, and it is that

the caravan is so designed that it can be opened accordion-fashion to a width which exceeds that of a railway coach. CLERIC ENVISIONS VATICAN TRYING TO WIN BACK ENGLAND

NOTTINGHAM, Eng., March 11.—The Rev. Dr. Alfred Sharp, in his presidential address at the annual national council of the Evangelical Free churches today, said "We are approaching the time when once again there will be a clash between the two opposing forces."

"Rome works with deadly persistency," said Dr. Sharp, a past president of the Wesleyan conference. "The prize—the winning back of England to the Roman faith—is a great one, all that devotion, strength and persistency can accomplish will be thrown in to the conflict. I have no fear of the result of the free churches will stand firm."

Continuing, Dr. Sharp said that the free churches could never accept state domination. The bishop of Durham had contended the domination of the state in the mother church should be abolished, but to obtain "this freedom" Dr. Sharp added, "the price must be paid."

SHEEP SHEARERS AGREE ON 15 CENTS PER HEAD

BAND CONCERT TO RAISE MONEY FOR NEW INSTRUMENTS

The Roseburg Municipal band is preparing a very interesting program to be presented Thursday night at the Junior high school auditorium as a means of raising additional funds to purchase equipment to increase the instrumentation.

The band is greatly enthused over the prospect of competing in the northwest band contest to be staged at Jamison park in Portland this summer, and every indication is that Roseburg has an excellent chance to win this great honor, and at least, will give Roseburg some exceptionally fine advertising and publicity.

Director Dale Strang is anxious to increase the effectiveness of the band by providing additional instrumentation. An oboe was recently added and it is now proposed to purchase a tympani set and a bassoon. Naturally the musicians cannot afford to buy these instruments, and it becomes necessary for the band as an organization to purchase them.

The concert Thursday night is to be held for the purpose of raising these needed funds and tickets are now on sale. The band recently played a benefit concert for the high school parent-teacher association, and received an offer of 50 per cent of the proceeds in order to allow all receipts to be applied to the association's project. Because of this attitude on the part of the band, it is conceded that the musicians are entitled to a great deal of support in their present enterprise.

The band now has over 40 musicians turning out regularly for rehearsals and a very high grade of music is being presented.

MAC DONALD LOSES COAL LEVY VOTE; URGED TO RESIGN

LONDON, March 11.—The MacDonald government was defeated 232 to 274 late today when the House divided on a second amendment to the coal bill having to do with a control levy.

Previously the government had won on the first of several divisions on amendments by a vote of 272 to 212.

There was much confusion in the house following the vote, and for several minutes it was impossible for the tellers to announce the result owing to a storm of cheering from the opposition benches.

When the figures were announced they were greeted with opposition cries of "resign."
