SCHOOL DISTRICT TAX ASSAILED IN INJUNCTION SUIT

A suit to enjoin school district No. 8, at Canyonville, from collecting special school taxes in the sum of \$4,490 has been brought in the circuit court by Harriett Odle, M. E. Manley and Alice Manley. The suit is filed against V. T. Jackson as tax collector, the county court, school district and directors and officers of the school board of that district.

It is claimed in the complaint that no regular meeting was held to authorize the special school tax, for which a levy of 12.5 mills was made. It is charged that the school clerk did not advertise the meeting, as required by law, that no budget was posted and no legal meeting held, and that, therefore, the tax is not legal.

The court is being asked to enjoin the district from collecting the tax, and the county officers are named in the complaint to prevent the tax from being collected should it be held illegal by the circuit court. The plaintiffs are represented by Attorney Ray B. Compton.
