

GENSUS TO START APRIL 2 TO DELVE INTO ECONOMICS

(Associated Press Leaded Wire)
WASHINGTON, March 12.— Uncle Sam is preparing to count noses again.
An army of 100,000 census-takers will begin knocking at house doors throughout the country April 2 in the nation's 15th decennial count of its population.
Many new questions, along with the old ones, are to be asked this time. The 1930 census will delve deeply into the country's economic life as well as providing the usual basis for reapportionment of seats in the house of representatives.
At least 24 questions have been prepared for each interview, and each person quizzed may answer without fear that family figures will be made public. The law imposes severe penalties if secrecy is not kept by the enumerators.
One new question asks the value of a home, if owned, or the monthly rental, if rented. Answers to this will make possible a classification of families' buying power.
Seeking the relative age at marriage of persons in different racial and economic groups, the government's agents will ask "age at first marriage."
Answers to this query will expedite tabulations of data on ages of families, based on the number of children reported in families of women who have been married a stated number of years.
A question regarding ownership of radio sets will give a direct answer as to size of the nation's potential radio audience.

Buyer Held Guilty
"Political creed" of the Woman's national committee for law enforcement, outlining fourteen points in support of the eighteenth amendment, and the constitution as a whole, was presented yesterday by Mrs. Henry W. Peabody, of Beverly, Mass. The fifth point of the creed read:
"We believe that under the existing act the buyer is equally guilty with the seller in illicit transactions in liquor."
In addition the creed said the organization believed in "law observance for the promotion of life, property, homes and human rights," and that it did not believe authority or precedent existed for subversion of the constitution "as a whole or in part," to a national referendum.
Fair Press Asked
It said the organization felt that the press has been in the past and should now be a moral asset, without regard to the personal opinions of owner and editor, to give fair representation of the views of law abiding people and the government. It added that in view of the "disloyal and dangerous" attitude of men and women of wealth and influence that law enforcement groups should be formed throughout the country.
The creed affirmed a belief in the constitution and said "We believe that prohibition of opium, alcohol and other habit making drugs is a necessary protection in this machine age."
It expressed the firm belief that the eighteenth amendment, ratified by 46 of the 48 states, was binding on all and that the limit of one-half of one percent intoxicating liquors was a "safe" standard for children and those not in contact with alcohol.
Economic Boon Seen
Further it asserted a belief of economic benefits of millions of dollars had resulted under prohibition and said it believed that the "moral issues makes this law obligatory for the individual citizen and the duty of every church member," and added that the church should teach respect for the statute.
The creed said women who had "endured personal slavery through drunken husbands" were entitled to their personal liberty and that the "law breakers must not be law makers."

TOURIST CAMPS

(State Board of Health)
In preparation for the rapidly approaching out-of-doors season, tourist camps should be placed in a sanitary condition and camp-ground owners should have their camps ready to receive the traveling public. Everything should be done to protect the health of the tourist. This means that an unquestionable water supply should be provided; cabins should be thoroughly cleaned and sunned, and the grounds should be raked and all waste materials incinerated.
There are many things in the way of equipment that add to the convenience and comfort of the tourist. Such equipment is really necessary for the operation of a successful camp. A good water supply, adequate toilet facilities, good drainage, and effective garbage disposal are the requisites of a modern tourist camp.
The practice of stopping overnight at tourist camps is growing, and this year tourists travel promises to be greater than ever. Many thousands of tourists are planning to visit Oregon this year, and a greater demand is being made on the tourist camps of this state. It is the duty of the camp-ground owners to see that the tourist is provided with really comfortable roadside camps that are inviting. Good camps are always full and reservations usually have to be made in advance. The poorer camps complain that they are unable to provide conveniences due to their lack of trade. The essentials of a good camp are general cleanliness, and modern conveniences such as adequate and convenient toilet facilities, hot and cold water, shower baths, laundry, kitchen and dining rooms. A camp should always be able to show a clean bill of health. The attendants should be clothed in clean washable uniforms.
Millions of dollars have been spent on our highways and the camp owner is asked to co-operate in providing modern service for the tourist who uses them. Each season there has been an improvement in the camps of this state, but many camps are yet below standard and are not a credit to the state. See that the camps in your community get a reputation that will bring more tourists every year. The community can assist the owner in creating a congenial atmosphere about the tourist camp.

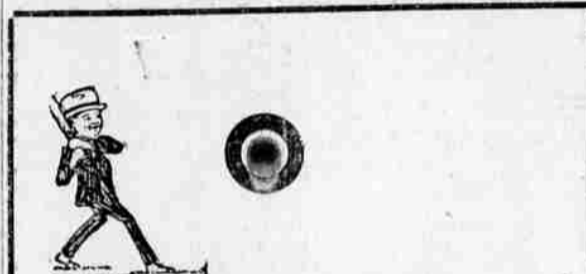

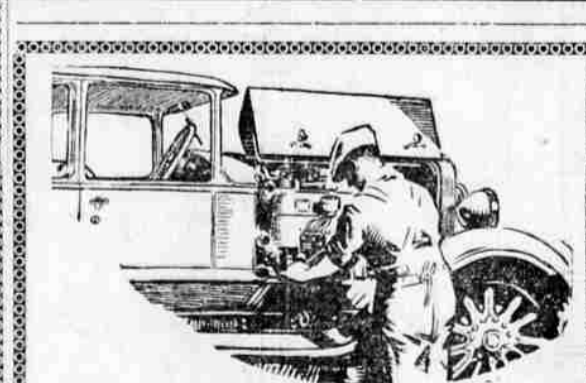

name of a former leader of the German army by violating these laws. To this I reply: I spent my life in that great school of devotion to duty, the old army, and there learned without reference to my person to do my duty toward my interland, race, in deciding this question, every thought or opinion had to be submerged completely for this reason the idea of getting out from under by a pretense or by resigning the presidency could gain no foothold within me.
Old Slogan Voiced
The president continued with the following slogan:
"I appeal to all Germans to chop names, irrespective of parties, for cooperation in the common task. Almost sixty years ago when the Reich was founded, I was one of those who experienced the joy which filled every German breast at the time. I believe that I cannot think this has disappeared and has given place to continuous inner political division. Despite, and on account of the exigencies of the times, it behooves us to come to ourselves and to result in one thought—Deutschland über alles."

ANOTHER ANGLE OF WEMME CASE GETS IN SUPREME COURT

SALEM, Ore., March 12.—Another E. Henry Wemme endowment fund case will be argued in the supreme court today. This is the case of the Wemme heirs, August Wemme, Julius Wemme and Pauline Grohmann, appellants, against Allen P. Noyes and the other trustees of the fund. Thomas Mannix will appear as attorney for the appellants and Joseph, Haney & Veatch are attorneys for the trustees.
This is the case, mentioned frequently in the Joseph and Mannix disbarment trials, in which the heirs seek to have the trustees removed and the fund revert to themselves. They contend that the trustees are illegally employing George Joseph as their attorney, and charge Joseph with secretly selling real estate belonging to the fund to his clients at less than its value. They contend that it is the duty of the attorney general to furnish legal aid to the legal charities of the state. They charge the trustees with failing to recover the White Shield home in compliance with the former supreme court opinion. This home was established under the terms of the Wemme will by the Christian Science churches and later sold to the Salvation Army.
The trustees demurred to the complaint on grounds that the Wemme heirs were without legal capacity to sue. The demurrer was sustained by Judge Robert Tucker of the circuit court for Multnomah county and heirs appealed. With reference to the complainant's allegations about Joseph the heirs brand this as a personal attack.

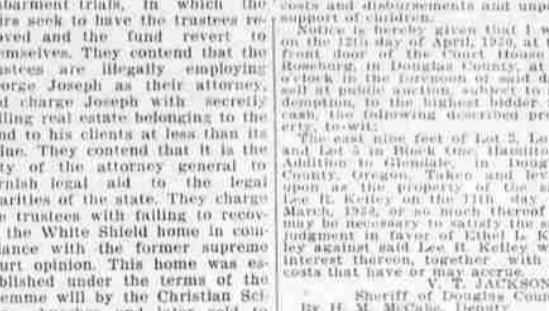
