RYCKMAN EXPLAINS BASS FISHING BAN

PORTLAND, Ore., March 12.—Matt L. Ryckman, state superintendent of hatcheries, said today that the closed bass fishing season, between April 15 and July 1, is nothing more than adequate insurance for Oregon's future supply of that species of game fish.

During the months of May, June and July when the annual high water floods the lowlands, the bass seek the sedge and banks for their spawning beds.

At this time, he said, when they are engaged in guarding their eggs and their young for a short period after the hatch has taken place, they are particularly voracious and vicious.

The measure was adopted at the last session of the game commission when Ryckman suggested that such a season be enforced.

(Associated Press Local Wire) MARSHFIELD, Ore., March 13.—Personal damages of \$1,000 and other damages of more than \$500 are sought in a suit filed here yesterday by Dr. W. V. Glaisyer, county veterinarian and dairy inspector, against Harvey Hale, county agent following a personal encounter between them over dairy cattle inspection.

The quarrel, which is said to have occurred in a hotel room at Coquille, ended with the plaintiff suffering a broken nose and swollen arm, alleged to have been inflicted by Hale's fist.

Hale resigned recently as county agent to accept a similar position in Idaho.

COIN, NOT WHEAT, ASKED FOR CHINA

(Associated Press Local Wire) WASHINGTON, March 13.—Officials of the China famine relief committee told the senate agriculture committee today they would prefer a direct appropriation in preference to the proposal of Senator McMaster, republican, South Dakota, to purchase \$25,000,000 of American wheat for the sufferers.

The relief officials said an emergency situation existed and

that there was food in China if the funds were available to distribute it. They asserted it would take 90 days to get wheat into the famine areas from this country.

THE GIFT OF LEADERSHIP

"A full-blooded Shoshone Indian who has shown a remarkable ability in persuading his fellow men to go to work in the industrial shops of the west is in Washington to advise the Indian service in its plan for setting up a \$50,000 Indian employment service.

"A year ago the Indian service's attention was called by the Indian, Pacific railway to George P. LaVatta, who in the 19 years that he had worked in their shops at Pocatello, Ida., had not only risen from a menial job to one which put him in charge of the welfare of a large section of employees, but had brought numerous Indians to work in the shops and along the routes which he was in charge. The government was quick to see the value of such a man in the Indian service and appointed LaVatta as overseer of Indian employment" with headquarters in Salt Lake City.

"Mr. LaVatta, in his governmental position establishes contacts with railroad and other industrial officials in a number of western states and gets their promise to let him know when they have vacancies that Indians can fill. Meanwhile he makes visits to Indian schools and reservations and lines up prospects for the jobs."

True leadership is a noble gift; 'Tis tact another soul to lift. Until his roving fancy's caught And follows on in harnessed thought, The one who builds this magnet force To lead men on an upward course— Become to them a lighthouse tower— Discovers much unconscious power.

Know Your State



Ready Home Market Awaiting All Flax That Oregon Can Produce: Will Grow Wherever Wheat Does.

Oregon started the world at the Philadelphia world's exposition by capturing first prize for fibre flax. Acreage in 1930 is about 7,500 with 10,500 in prospect for 1931. The Willamette valley has thousands of acres suitable for flax raising. Oregon flax is raised in a regular program of crop rotation and is not hard on the land. Any farmer who can grow wheat can grow flax. Two bushels of seed is sowed to the acre. Harvest comes about 110 days later. Flax is now plowed and baled by a machine with two operators. After threshing it is placed in tanks under water to dissolve the gum that holds the fibre. It is then dried, run through machines that break the woody substance from the fibre. It is now scutched which separates the fibre from the woody parts. It is now baled for the spinning mill. The Oregon state penitentiary has a complete flax and linen producing plant. The states Linon Mills is another Salem, Oregon, concern making linen products, especially fishermen's twine which is highly regarded throughout the industry. Flax seed is an important by-product as Oregon imports large amounts for making flaxseed products. Oregon farmers can contract with the state of Oregon for the sale of their fibre flax before it is grown. During 1929 the state paid \$40 per ton for flax over 26 inches in length; \$35 a ton for flax 20 to 26 inches in length and corresponding prices for shorter lengths. Cash is paid on delivery. The crop runs from 15 to 25 tons per acre. With great quantities of linen and linen products imported into this country every year, Oregon has a unique opportunity to greatly expand the flax industry and the manufacture of flax into linen of the highest quality.
