

ROSEBURG HIGH 5 LYING IN TOURNNEY AT MARSHFIELD

The Roseburg senior high school basketball team, champions of the Southwestern Oregon basketball conference, left this morning for Marshfield to engage in the tournament to be held for the purpose of selecting the team to represent the district at the state championship tournament in Salem.

Roseburg will play three games, meeting Bandon this afternoon and either Coquille or Riverton at night. The local boys are facing a rather tough schedule. Bandon, the first team Roseburg will meet, gave the players a hard fight in both of their conference games, and is still dangerous. Coquille, expected to win from Riverton in the afternoon game, is the only team that has defeated Roseburg this year, so that the local boys have two hard battles scheduled for today.

North Bend, expected to go into the finals with Roseburg, may be upset in the first contest, according to information from Coos Bay. The entrance of Port Orford into the tournament, by consent of the competing teams, has placed a dark horse in the running. Port Orford has a rangy, speedy team. It is reported with a very fast offense, and the teams are worried over the possible strength of this Curry county quintet.

Riverton turned back Arago in the contest for the championship of the district B league. The two teams completed the race tied for first place and engaged in a game on Bandon's neutral floor Wednesday night to decide the honors.

The schedule for today's games was: 9:30 a. m., Myrtle Point vs. Arago; 10:30 a. m., North Bend vs. Port Orford; 2:00 p. m., Coquille vs. Riverton; 9:00 p. m., Roseburg vs. Bandon. Evening: Winner of Myrtle Point-Arago game versus winner of North Bend-Port Orford game; winner Coquille-Riverton game versus winner of Roseburg-Bandon game. The finals will be played Saturday night.

The Roseburg team was accompanied by a number of local fans. In the event the boys reach the finals, doubtless many more fans will go to Coos Bay Saturday afternoon to attend the game.

TODAY'S MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., March 14.—No change was reported today in either butter or egg quotations. Receipts were liberal, but demand was sufficient to take care of what reported with a very fast offense.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says: "Although Imperial valley lettuce loadings continue in excess of 250 cars daily, sharp declines in volume are expected within the next few days, according to shippers and receiving brokers. Many of the present loadings show only fair quality, and shipping-point prices are steadily tending upward. Sales to Portland retailers show slight price advances; however, track supplies promise to continue liberal for the next few days, at least."

"The Chicago potato market has shown decided strength on Idaho stock, during most of the week; which is reflected in firmness at Idaho shipping points. Washington shipping point prices have shown little variation for a week or so, however."

"Asparagus declined again, especially on less desirable stock. Much of present asparagus offerings show poor color, and many are muddy."

"Oranges advanced again—their 8th consecutive day of increasing prices. Cabbage threatens to eclipse all former high-altitude records, with the market strong at 9c per
