THE MODESTY OF TRUE COURAGE

The marine corps' most modest man has been found. He is Corporal Ernest Ballinger, who recently sought to escape the formal presentation to himself of the coveted Navy Cross for bravery while in Nicaragua.

While in Nicaragua, Corporal Ballinger, with an advance party, overpowered a detail of Nicaraguan bandits and captured a machine gun nest.

Later, assigned to the marine base here, he went on duty as mail clerk and recently while sorting mail found a package from the secretary of the navy addressed to himself. Upon opening it he discovered a glittering Navy Cross which ranks next to the Medal of Honor, being a modest marine, he slipped the award into his blouse pocket and told no one about it.

But the next day, Col. Harry T. L. commandant of the base, received a letter with instructions to present formally to Corporal Ballinger a Navy Cross which had previously been mailed. Upon cross-examination, the marine admitted he had received the award but explained it was far more enjoyable to receive a medal than to stand in front of a regiment and receive an award of valor. The navy department, however, does not quietly confer medals on its heroes and at a later ceremony the cross was pinned on Corporal Ballinger with all the flourish of a formal presentation.
