

YONCALLA, RIDDLE POULTRY RAISERS LISTEN TO EXPERT

Expand to Business Basis
or Quit, Advice Given
by H. E. Cosby of
State College.

At a well attended poultry meeting held at Riddle and Yoncalla, under the joint auspices of the O. S. C. extension service and the agricultural committees of the granges, H. E. Cosby, extension poultryman, outlined some of the possibilities of commercial egg production in Douglas county.

According to Mr. Cosby the poultry outlook for the present year is very good, with prices probably on a somewhat lower basis than in 1929, which was the best year the poultry people have experienced recently.

Egg prices run in cycles which are comparatively short, never extending over a period of more than three or four years.

The speaker pointed out that Oregon is now on an export basis, the last year having imported only the state in 1926. Exports now total 500 to 700 cases of eggs per year. The total sales prices of all poultry products in Oregon amount to about \$12,000,000, or about 1 percent of the total of the United States.

Expand or Quit, Advice
In the opinion of Mr. Cosby the poultry business can be expanded several hundred percent in Oregon without materially affecting the price in general. Due to the fact that the marketing is well taken care of by the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers, and with the natural favorable climatic and feed conditions in Douglas county, egg producers were advised to increase their flocks to an economical basis or go out of the business entirely.

High quality eggs are needed to stand the long distance shipping to the eastern markets, and eggs from small flocks are too often of low quality due to infrequent shipments, especially during the periods of low production.

It was pointed out that good hens return a profit in years of low prices, and that returns of \$100 per hen could be expected even in average years and \$200 or more in years of good prices.

Mr. Cosby suggested units of 1700 hens for economical production. Larger flocks and extreme care in purchasing baby chicks were urged by Mr. Cosby.

Movies Are Shown
Two reels of motion pictures dealing with the poultry industry were shown and proved of great interest to those present. The pictures were entitled "Oregon's Poultry Industry" and "Marketing Eggs." H. W. Grow, instructor in Smith-Hughes agriculture in the Roseburg high school, operated the moving picture machine. J. C. Leedy, county agent, outlined the series of contests devised to stimulate interest in the poultry industry and to reward the good operators for improved practices.

O. V. Logsdon, master of the Riddle grange, presided at the Riddle meeting, and J. B. Wilson, member of the agricultural committee of the Drain grange, presided at Yoncalla.

NORTH BEND HIGH FIVE WINS ENTRY IN STATE CONTEST

North Bend, twice defeated by Roseburg, won the high school basketball district tournament at Marshfield Saturday night by defeating Coquille 15 to 14 in a very wild and exciting game. Roseburg won the consolation game, played against Myrtle Point, by a score of 43 to 13. Its virtue of its victory, North Bend will compete in the coming tournament for the state high school championship.

Roseburg was eliminated Friday by Coquille, after the team had been exhausted and crippled in a game with Bandon Friday afternoon.

Coquille started against North Bend as if it would win the tournament, leading 10 to 6 at the half. North Bend, however, came back in the third quarter and forked the lead.

With one minute to go, North Bend was ahead 45 to 42, but Coquille dropped in another field goal and was leading by one point when the final whistle blew. Roseburg, which had recovered from its exhaustion of the preceding night, played a whirlwind game against Myrtle Point. The Coos county team led the first quarter 8 to 5, but Roseburg then hit its normal pace, and Myrtle Point secured only 5 points in the rest of the game, while Roseburg ran its score up to 43 points.

The local team tied Coquille for the highest score of the tournament, 45 points, and held Myrtle Point to the lowest score of the tournament, 13 points.

The Roseburg high school team has completed a very satisfactory season, despite the disappointment of the tournament, having won 17 out of 15 games, making 478 points to 341 scored by their opponents, winning the championship of the Southwestern Oregon district.

He said he was not ready to state to what extent the prohibition law could be enforced. He was emphatic in declaring that the law was not being enforced perfectly, but neither in the law against a defendant.

He said he did not know the future course of the Hoover commission on expressing an opinion as to the 15th amendment.

It was indicated some time ago by Senator Jones, republican, Washington, that the commission might not express its views on the dry law but Wickham said today that this still had to be determined upon by the commission.

SALISBURY, Ore., March 17.—Governor Norblad, in a letter to Judge Zimmerman of Astoria Saturday, ordered a special grand jury inquiry into the affairs of the defunct Northwest Pulp & Paper company of that place.

At the same time the governor asked Attorney General Van Winkle to name a special prosecutor for the investigation, and L. A. Lilequist of Marshfield, former assistant attorney general was appointed.

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KENNETH J. LANE SETS AN ECONOMY MARK AT O. S. C.

Kenneth J. Lane of Roseburg, who is completing his degree in forestry at the Oregon State college, has set a new record for economy in personal finances, according to the O. S. C. Barometer. He has attended college for four years at a total cost of \$1,408, of which he earned all except \$468.

"This record, remarkable for its detail as well as for its economy, shows an average total expense of only \$352 a year," the Barometer states, quoting Dr. W. M. Atwood, chairman of the student loan fund. "The average of 219 students who turned in their budgets to the loan office in 1928-29 was \$616.67."

"I certainly wouldn't recommend students in general to plan going to college on any such meager amount as Lane has made out his needs, but certainly it is revealing as to what can be and is being done by students determined to gain an education in spite of financial difficulties."

For his freshman year Lane spent only \$279.30, of which he earned \$202 in the summer previous. His highest year was while a junior, when he spent \$413.69. This year he is holding his budget of \$390, including \$46 for insurance.

To complete the year he estimates he will need exactly \$122 in addition to his earnings, and he has applied for that amount from the student loan fund—which amount, needless to say, has been approved by Dr. Atwood.

Such a record can be made only by "bitching," according to Dr. Atwood, and that has been Lane's method. His total cost for board for the entire school year is \$90. Naturally he hasn't spent much on "frills," though one year his accounts show gifts, \$15; church, \$7; amusement, \$5; and postage and incidentals, \$15.

Work with the federal bureau of plant industry in blaster rust scouting work in the summer has been his chief source of income, though he has also worked as a clerk, as a janitor and on the highway. Contrary to the usual custom of self-supporting students, he does very little work in the school year, leaving his time for school work and "housekeeping." Incidentally, he has excelled in scholarship, recently becoming a member of the forestry honor society of Xi Sigma Phi. He plans to enter the forest service after graduation and later return for graduation work toward a master's degree.

One red dress gown now Moscow demanded the closing of all churches and shrines throughout the whole of Moscow province, including the capital, and decided to establish a systematic competition with other army units for the spread of anti-religious propaganda.

Prayers of Protest
NEW YORK, March 17.—Thousands of persons of all religious faiths gathered in cathedrals, churches, synagogues and meeting halls yesterday to pray for the end of religious persecution in Russia.

While speakers at the protest services were denouncing attacks on religion by the soviet government, 12,000 reds held a counter demonstration in Bronx coliseum.

Monsignor M. J. Lavelle, rector of St. Patrick's Roman Catholic cathedral, said in a sermon that the soviet action was worse than the Roman persecution of early Christians and was only comparable to the "orgies of the French revolution."

Bishop William T. Manning, Protestant Episcopal, led special services for all Protestant denominations in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine. In addition to Bishop Manning the speakers at the cathedral were the Rev. Dr. William B. Miller, secretary of the greater New York federation of churches; the Rev. Dr. Raymond

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L. Forman, pastor of St. Paul's Methodist Episcopal church and the Rev. Henry Howard, pastor of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church.

Bishop Manning said it was the openly avowed purpose of the soviet government to exterminate religion from the lives of the whole Russian people.

Three detectives walked with Bishop Manning in the procession and remained close throughout the service. A detail of 200 police was stationed about the cathedral.

Lawmakers Speak
Senator Foss of Ohio spoke at a meeting of the Jewish American congress in Town hall. He said that only aroused public opinion could defeat "the sinister purpose" of winning youth to anti-religion.

Representative Hamilton Fish, Jr., of New York, at the Town hall meeting demanded a more militant policy on the part of the government against the activities of communists in the United States.

At the counter demonstration of the communists William Z. Foster and other speakers derided Christianity and attacked the pope, Mussolini, capitalism and Police Commissioner Grover A. Whalen. A force of 450 police was on hand to prevent an attempt to hold a parade.

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DOUGLAS GRANGES 100 PCT. SOLID ON COOPERATIVE PLAN

One hundred percent cooperation of Douglas county grange agricultural committees is reported by County Agent J. C. Leedy who has been cooperating with Chairman Fred Goff of the state grange agricultural committee on the marketing and economic information project. Every grange in the county now has a member of the agricultural committee appointed to receive and read the agricultural situation, market outlook, price trend and other timely economic, statistical and marketing circulars available from the college extension service and the bureau of agricultural economics. These committees will report items of local interest and importance at grange meetings.

The Douglas county grange agricultural committees have also lined up solidly back of the farm price reporting project. A member of each committee has enrolled to report each month average prices being received by producers in his neighborhood for farm products. The trend of prices from month to month and from year to year will be made on the prices received and marketed, and comparisons will be made of the prices received in Douglas county and in Oregon with those for other states and the nation.

Information received from L. R. Hays, extension economist at Corvallis, indicates that Douglas county is the first county to report 100 per cent cooperation of the grange agricultural committees in this work. Chairmen of the agricultural committees of the Douglas county granges are:
