THE ROMANCE OF BUSINESS

At 67 years of age, Joseph R. Grundy, after a lifetime of business, goes to Washington as a senator from Pennsylvania. He has never before had a seat in either house of congress. And yet in some ways it might be said that no one has ever entered congress who was more familiar with its workings. No one has ever been sent to the national legislature who has had the interests of his own state more at heart.

For years Mr. Grundy has been known in the capital as a lobbyist. No one has worked harder for a cause in carrying out his plan he has come into contact with both the house and the senate.

But to him there is no sudden jump between his former activities and his present ones, to his way of thinking, it is as much the duty of the citizen to take an active part in the affairs of government as it is for the officeholder, be he elected or appointed.

"We are all just human beings," he said, "and because a man does the senatorial toga, he is not changed, nor are his duties toward his country any more important as far as he himself is concerned than those of the humblest citizen when he or she is called upon to exercise the right of suffrage. After all, the senate may be likened to a board of directors, or at least a committee of a board of directors who manage a great business. For the running of this country yearly becomes more a business problem.—S. J. Wood in the New York Times Feb. 16, 1929.

The Oregon State college band, attired in new and colorful uniforms, will arrive here the forenoon of Saturday, March 22, for its concert program in the gardens that same evening. The concert will be followed by a dance at the same place.

Forty-five of the best college musicians are in the band, including some with considerable reputation. Raymond Cooney, one of Oregon's best trumpet soloists, is coming again, and a popular comedy saxophone quartet is included.

The band program itself will feature such famous numbers as "William Tell Overture," "Slavonic Dance No. 2," "Semper Fidelis," and "Stars and Stripes Forever." An eight-piece collegiate dance band composed entirely of band members and selected as the pick of campus musicians will play the latest song hits for the evening dance. Seven out of the eight musicians made the trip last year.

Captain H. L. Beard, nationally known band director, will make his 25th annual tour with the band this year.

The band will arrive in the city some time during the forenoon of the day of performance, and will parade through the business district of the city later.
