U. S. INCOME TAX COLLECTIONS DROP

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, March 19—Further treasury reports on the March 15 collection of income taxes indicated today that budget estimates for the first quarter's receipts would be nearly met.

Up to the close of business on March 17, receipts turned in amounted to \$29,665,010, about \$10,000,000 behind the total counted by the same time last year.

If this proportion should apply also to the remaining collections as they are audited and reported to the treasury, the quarterly total would be about \$50,000,000 behind the \$60,000,000 collected last year.

It was the expectation of the treasury, when the budget for this quarter was made up, and a reduction was made in the tax rate, that the quarterly collection would total about \$55,000,000.

Columbia River Bridge, Highest Highway Span in America, to be Opened March 29



Formal dedication of the six million-dollar Columbia river bridge connecting Longview, Wash., and Rainier, Ore., will take place at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of March 29. This highest highway span over a navigable stream in America will be opened when President Hoover presides the golden key to the executive offices at the White House. As the electric spark severs the bridge barrier in the center of the Columbia, 30,000 motorists, moving in opposite traffic lines will pass over the great steel structure, which rises in its center span of 1,200 feet, to a height of 194 feet. The chief executives of Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and British Columbia will be present at the dedication. Specially decorated motor caravans, representing chambers of commerce, service clubs, and fraternal organizations, will be in line from all parts of the Pacific coast. This includes 112 feet long, is another link of the Pacific highway, that gives the touring motorist direct route into northwestern Oregon and the Oregon Teaches over the scenic Columbia river highway.

Completion of 12 miles of highway between Aplary and Vernonia, Ore., will connect the west side Pacific highway with the new bridge and materially shorten the important arterial route.

The day the new bridge goes into service, Astoria, near the mouth of the river, will be 100 miles closer to Washington by an all land route.

With 200 men working without the loss of a day for eight months, the last piece of steel was riveted into place without loss of life or a single serious accident recorded.

LOVELACE OUSTER AT SOLDIERS' HOME UPHELD BY BOARD

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SALEM, Ore., March 19.—The discharge of Charles A. Lovelace from the State Soldiers' Home at Roseburg, which action was taken by Commandant Sam Starmer last September, was sustained by the board of control today over the protest of Lovelace who appeared in person and also by attorney.

The records showed that Starmer discharged the veteran for drunkenness. Lovelace admitted drinking, but said that another inmate who had been drunk three times was reinstated. It developed that the commandant had other grievances against Lovelace.

Lovelace is said to be a veteran of the Spanish war, the Philippine insurrection, the Boxer rebellion and the World war. Although he was 50 years old when the United States entered the World war, he saw service in France. He is now 62.

His discharge from the home is not made dishonorable.

5 CO-EDS CAPTURE FUGITIVE MONKEY

(Associated Press Leased Wire) MADISON, Wis., March 19.—The monkey that escaped Sunday from the University of Wisconsin zoology department has been captured, not by the pooses organized especially for that purpose, but by five co-eds.

For two days the monkey search was the talk of the campus. Law and engineering students were excused from some of their classes and formed posses to make a systematic search, but found no trace of the animal.

Last night one of the members of the Arden club awoke to find a hairy face peering at her. She screamed and five other co-eds, armed with golf clubs and canes, ran to her rescue. Surrounding the monkey got him on the bed, wrapped him up in the covers, and the monkey search was over.

DOHENY'S COUNSEL TOUCHES VITAL SPOT

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, March 19.—Counsel for Edward L. Doheny today asked Justice Hix to instruct the jury that under the law Albert B. Fall, convicted of accepting a bribe from Doheny, could be guilty and the wealthy oil man at the same time be innocent of giving the bribe.

The government asked that the jury be instructed that if Doheny gave \$100,000 to Fall intended to influence his award of the Elk Hills naval oil reserve he be found guilty.

The pleas were made with the jury absent only a short time before final arguments in the case were to begin.
