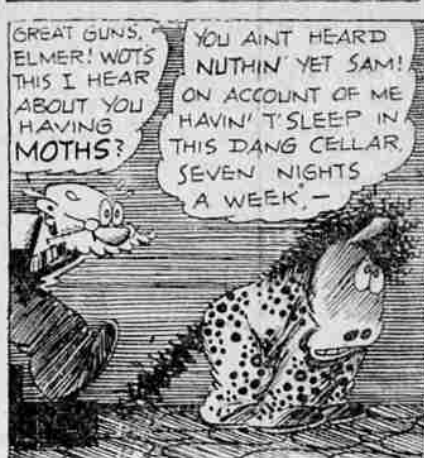

Coming Census to Show Illiteracy Decline

States Hitherto "Backward" in Education Have Advanced Far in Meantime.

(Associated Press Special Wire)

WASHINGTON, March 20—All over the nation men and women from 15 to 80 are running a race with the census taker in an effort to make their respective states rank lower in illiteracy in the 1930 census than they did 10 years ago.

Mrs. Cora Wilson Stewart, director of the national illiteracy crusade, predicts the coming census will hold surprises. States hitherto listed as "backward" may climb up the educational scale while some which have held first place may slip.

"First reports on illiteracy on May 1 will be received in many states with the same excitement as election returns," says Mrs. Stewart, who has been touring the country.

Tennessee, for example, with 187,629 illiterates listed in 1920, started night schools all over the state to make a good record for the census taker. In Idaho county about 30 fathers and mothers are being taught.

Blackfoot Indians in Montana have been walking seven miles, even with temperatures 30 and 40

degrees below zero, to attend night school.

They were regarded as the hardest adults to reach. Asked to choose awards for good marks, all chose clocks. For the first time in their lives, as a result of their newly acquired education, they were able to tell time.

Louisiana, which in the 1920 census had the highest percentage of illiterates, now has 7,200 adults in one parish enrolled in night school.

THE IMMORTALITY OF YOUTH

Schools of the Mother Goose dispute still go rumbling through scholastic halls and in houses where children live. It reached the peak of argument some weeks ago, when professors were quoted in acrimonious interviews, and experts swapped at each other cross columns of print, but unlike many verbal battles it was not ended by one sharp tilt.

The reason seems to be that this is one of those perpetual arguments which is founded on deeplying human differences. It has raged intermittently ever since the old rhymes rose from a precarious and shifting life on the streets to the dignity of published pages. Between the people who say that Mother Goose rhymes are rubbish and the ones who regard them as the priceless heritage of all English-speaking peoples, there is no possibility of permanent peace. Sometimes the quarrel lies quiet, but there is no illusion of agreement. Then some one makes a rash statement and the whole difference of opinion bursts to the surface. It happened this winter just as it happened in the days of Coleridge and Charles Lamb. For a week or two a group of verses hundreds of years old became the latest news. Memories were brushed off and reburied. Prejudices were polished until they shot forth in brilliant beams. Every one was convinced of the essential rightness of his position—Mildred Adams in the New York Times.

Old Mother Goose, that lively dame—What memories cluster round her name! She has the heritage of youth. Claims each new age as hers forsooth: To every normal girl and boy She is a fount of bubbling joy: She has a message for them all. To age she's not the same at all.

There is a time in every life When she's with all the virtues rife; Become the center of romance, Around her groups of fairies dance, And then, when she has had her way, And blithely gone along her way, She's like the shadow of a dream—Like vapor from escaping steam.

We'll never settle this debate; It is the mockery of fate That grown up men, not fit to judge, Should childhood's happiness begrudge. Old Mother Goose is childhood's saint; She's like the pictures springtime paint—They do not show on autumn days—They're blurred by summer's scorching days.

Old Mother Goose is more than hash; Her rhymes are more than balderdash. Wherever childhood's flowers bloom Her fragrance scents the nursery room. She waves imagination's wand, And children's hearts grow tender, fond. So long as youthful fancies live Old Mother Goose will pleasure give.

TODAY'S MARKETS

(Associated Press Special Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., March 20.—Butter prices were unchanged and firm today. Egg values also looked firm, but quotations were undisturbed. The Sperry Flour company has reduced the price of bakers' flour 20¢ a barrel and made reductions in all classes of mill and feedstuffs. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

The wholesale fruit and vegetable market was generally strong, with a few price advances, and no recessions. Cauliflower advanced a dime to \$1.35 per crate. Roseburg cauliflower sells at the same price as California stock, although the latter is generally considered more desirable on account of its greater uniformity.

The lettuce market is firm at \$1.25 per crate to retailers. An abundance of truck holdings, many of which show advanced maturity, is keeping the lettuce market from advancing more rapidly. Lettuce in selling at Imperial valley points today at about 10¢ a crate, as at Portland. With a freight rate of about \$1.00 per crate, higher priced grades is making the week in addition to the customary European forwardings.

"Texas cabbage, costing \$10.00 or more per ton, delivered Portland, made its first appearance of the season. Quality of the Texas arrivals is very good. European forwardings, 24¢.
