Talks on Health

I AM writing this on a railway train with snow all around and the thermometer standing below zero. The sun is bright but it fails to melt the sparkling snow a single particle.

But by the time this article reaches the public it will be springtime in parts of our country and approaching it in others. It will appear at a season when the young mother must exercise unusual care in watching over the welfare of her baby.

It is puzzling to know just how to dress the youngster on these first warm days. Perhaps one day will be cold and windy, the next the next may be bright and almost balmy. What should be done about the outer garments?

A baby ought to be out of doors three or four hours every day when it does not rain or snow. But of course there are two periods, nothing and afternoon outings, so the mother does not get far from home in the event of a sudden change in weather. It will be possible to get into the house almost immediately.

There are certain devices which every home where a baby is, should never be without. There should be a set of scales, at least one thermometer, one outside the window where it will be a guide to the mother. By consulting the thermometer she will know how warmly the baby should be dressed.

May I say in passing that rats does not do away with the importation of an improvised outfit. The infant should be wrapped up and placed in its carriage which is drawn up in front of an open window.

It is a mistake to dress the baby too warmly that it perspires. To do so is to invite trouble, the least form of which is chafing and chapping of the skin. Dampness of the intimate garments may result in a cold and that, in turn, might be the beginning of bronchitis or pneumonia.
