INCOME TAX PAID SHOWS DECREASE

WASHINGTON, March 21—The treasury announced today that income tax receipts as of March were \$76,632,567.41, bringing the total so far this month to \$381,823,126.29. This total for the month compared with \$379,981,831.78 for the corresponding period a year ago. Today's figure showed a falling off in comparison with the total receipts for March 19, 1929, which exceeded \$100,000,000. This decrease was expected in view of the speeding up of the bulk of collections.

STATE DEPARTMENTS NEED MORE MONEY

SALEM, Ore., March 21—The state emergency board will meet Friday afternoon, April 4 for the purpose of considering the authorization of an expenditure for construction of a new wing at the state penitentiary, and also a number of other requests from various state departments. The call for the meeting was issued today by Secretary of State Hoss at the request of the state board of control. In the neighborhood of \$55,000 will be requested by the penitentiary, and it is estimated that other requests will bring the total to around \$100,000. The state treasurer, the secretary of state, the reclamation commission and the supreme court will ask for funds. The need for a deficiency appropriation for the supreme court has arisen, it was said, from the expense of the Joseph and Mannix disbarment trials.
