STATES' 1930 ROAD OUTLAY FAR ABOVE 1929 EXPENDITURE

Cooperating with President Hoover in his plan to enlarge all construction programs as much as is practicable to ameliorate the unemployment situation, the states and their counties will spend in their road building programs for 1930 at least \$450,000,000 more than they spent in 1929.

Reports received from state highway departments and compiled by the bureau of public roads, U. S. department of agriculture, show that state and local authorities plan to spend \$1,601,167,455 for highway improvement in 1930.

The planned expenditure by state highway departments for construction and maintenance of state highways is \$937,500,455; the balance, \$663,667,000, will be spent, according to the estimates, on local roads and bridges. The state highway officials of 45 states estimate the total length of roads to be improved by them in 1930 as 22,312 miles, an increase of 3,126 miles over the estimate in the 1929 program. Three states failed to report contemplated mileages for 1930.

The highway departments of all states will control the maintenance of 281,293 miles of highways this year, an increase of 32,381 over the mileage under state maintenance in 1929. Gradually, the states are taking over into their systems for maintenance the more important county and local roads of the country.

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CONFIRMATION OF PARKER EXPECTED WITHOUT TROUBLE

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The nomination of Judge John J. Parker, of North Carolina, as an associate justice of the supreme court is expected to be approved by the senate with a minimum of opposition.

This view was expressed in many quarters today after study of the situation which found few signs of dissatisfaction and several pertinent factors to support the prediction.

Chief among the latter was the favorable attitude of the southern democrats. Parker is a republican, but the democrats from his section have a high regard for his qualifications and are "pleased" that the south has thus been recognized. In addition, the republican regulars are expected to support the president's selection.

Thus, it was pointed out, whatever opposition might develop is expected to be confined to the independent republicans from the west and it is by no means certain that objection will come from that quarter.

The Parker nomination was submitted to the senate by President Hoover just before midnight yesterday and at the same time, the chief executive said that the appointment would make the geographical distribution of the membership of the supreme court bench conform more closely with the original intent of those who formulated the constitution.

Parker was announced to succeed the late associate justice, Edward T. Sanford, who died on March 8, a few hours before the death of William Howard Taft. Sanford, too, was a republican.

MACHINE SUPREMACY IS OPERATIC THEME

BERLIN, March 21.—Grand opera in overalls made its debut at the Civic Opera house last night when Max Brand's "Machineist Hopkins" was shown to the press.

The theme is the machine's conquest of man. It begins and ends in a factory and whirling wheels, grinding pistons, clanking shafts and a final sorrowful aria sung by an electric switchboard which personifies the power behind the machinery.

The players are dwarfed by a huge piece of machinery which not only plays the principal part but to all intents and purposes sings the principal role.

GRASS, BRUSH AND RURISH FIRES ARE COSTLY TO STATE

SALEM, Ore., March 22.—(Special)—That grass, brush and rubbish fires are an "economic" burden of the state is indicated by statistics quoted in a bulletin just issued by State Fire Marshal Clarence A. Lee in the fire chiefs of the state, which shows that over 200 fires of such classification reported to the department during the summer season of 1929, caused damage to property approximately \$1,000,000. This estimate does not include the destruction to the state's forest wealth, nor the damage to crops and other property caused by such fires.

Eighty-four grass and brush fires caused some damage of over \$150,000 and 123 fires started in rubbish destroyed property values exceeding \$300,000. Consequently estimates place the average cost to the taxpayers of grass and brush fires, when the fire department merely turns out, at \$25 and, if it is turned on and prolonged fighting is necessary to

subdue the blaze, the cost mounts to \$50 and over \$100 per fire, it is claimed.

The bulletin, which heralds the opening of the spring clean-up campaign, urges the fire chiefs to organize and wage a relentless war upon the "unsightly, disease and fire-breeding dry grass, weed and brush-grown and rubbish-strewn vacant lots, right-of-way and field menace," and is supplemented by an appeal to the local chambers of commerce, Kiwanis, Lions, Rotary clubs and other civic organizations to cooperate with and support the fire chief in the crusade.

Few "Wall Flowers at Washington Parties

Mother's Careful to Have Plenty of Stags for Entertainment of Winsome "Debs."

WASHINGTON, March 19.—There are few wall flowers at debutante parties in Washington. Though the ratio of women to men in the capital is reckoned at 10 to 1, careful mothers and chaperones see to it that winsome debs have plenty of cavaliers.

Because of this wise and determined foresight, the girls fairly dance the soles off their slippers in a single evening. There are no disconsolate damsels draped along the walls.

Stag lines often extend half the length of the ballroom. A debutante must divide one dance among three or four men. That makes her look very popular. The stars "cut in" without ceremony. Debs smile and nod graciously and a moment later they ditch these partners for new ones.

Debs' spirits must never flag, her smile never waver, no matter how many hours she has been dancing. That's the social code. Next season's debutantes are beginning now to plan for their coming out parties while those of the present season are announcing their engagements. Several of the past winter's crop have married.

DRY LAW SAFE SO LONG AS WOMEN VOTE—MRS. BOOLE

WASHINGTON, March 21.—The house judiciary committee's prohibition hearings yesterday were recessed until next Wednesday after another day of dry testimony had ended with the arguments in favor of the law by Oliver W. Stewart, of Chicago, president of the flying squadron foundation.

America can look forward to prohibition as long as women have a vote, was the emphatic statement today of Mrs. Ella A. Boole, president of the National Women's Christian Temperance union.

"Today, no matter what maza-zine polls, gathered largely from lists of men, may show, as long as the 19th amendment stands the eighteenth amendment will stand also," were the words of Mrs. Boole, for years a leader of the dry cause.

Liquor is the issue. WALLACE, Idaho, March 21.—Declaring that "we do not need the paternal advice of our governor in doing a proper and legal act in conformity with the best traditions of the republic," State Senator Donald A. Callahan, president of the recently formed Idaho association for repeal of the 18th amendment, yesterday answered Governor Baldrige's a t t a c k against his anti-prohibition campaign.

Governor Baldrige of Idaho had assailed "anti-prohibition" campaignists that fail to offer an substitute to prevent the return of "moon days" and said that unless Callahan "is able to suggest something better than the present prohibition enforcement," he is "doing himself an injustice."

"The voters of Shoshone county have formed a perfectly legal and orderly association to work for the repeal of the 18th amendment," Senator Callahan's message today said. "They are following the course used by the prohibition forces in securing adoption of an amendment for the purpose of promoting temperance and securing co-operation with the law which fits the public conscience."

"When the 18th amendment has been removed the American people will be free to enact such legislation as will remedy present conditions and bring about respect for law. I am willing to trust to the judgment of the people, once they are free to act."

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
