Oregon's Pear Crop Worth \$5,500,000; Lands Range in Value From \$250 to \$1000 Per Acre.

Practically every fruit growing district of Oregon produces pears. The leading varieties are the Bartlett, Bosc, Comice, Winter Nellis and d'Anjou. The Rogue river district of southern Oregon is a large producer, shipping about 3,500 carloads in 1929, worth \$5,500,000. The Hood River district in north central Oregon produces about 80 per cent of the Bosc pears, the highest priced commercial variety. Oregon pears, because of their quality, pack and appearance have established themselves in the markets of the world and thousands of boxes are shipped to practically every country on the globe. In the main packing centers all pears are graded, wrapped in paper and placed in cold storage ready for shipment within a few hours from the time they are picked in the orchards. In the Medford district it is estimated that 3,000 extra laborers are needed during harvesting season. During the growing season the trees are frequently sprayed to kill all insects, then the fruit is thoroughly washed before being packed to remove all traces of spray. There are no finer pears produced anywhere than those grown on Oregon trees.

AIRPLANE USED TO SMUGGLE CHINESE; 5 ARRESTS RESULT

LOS ANGELES, March 21.—George E. Flaherty was arrested at his home here today by federal immigration agents, who said he admitted employing two airplane pilots to fly his \$50,000 transport to Mexico for the purpose of smuggling alien Chinese to the United States. Agents said Flaherty and

The airplane pilots are Harold A. Sweet, 26, of Los Angeles, and George V. Gray, 34, of Taff, Cal., the alleged receivers are John F. Smith, Jr., 24, of Los Angeles, and Eddie M. Collins, 34, of Long Beach, Cal. Smith and Collins represented themselves as real estate salesmen.

THREE MEN KILLED TESTING POWDER

DOVER, N. J., March 21.—An army officer and two civilian employees were killed today in an explosion of smokeless powder at the United States army arsenal at Picatinny, near here.
The dead, Captain U. B. Fiddler, of the ordnance department; Frank Stevens, and Stephen Devery.
Edward Goldsworthy was brought to Dover general hospital in a serious condition. Stevens and Devery, with Goldsworthy, were chemists at the arsenal.
Col. James Train, commanding officer of the arsenal, said the men were experimenting with a new kind of smokeless powder.

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HOOVER REDUCES MARINE FORCE ON ISLAND OF HAITI

WASHINGTON, March 21.—President Hoover today ordered about 550 of the marine force now detailed to Nicaragua to be withdrawn, reducing the total of the marine establishment now in that republic to between 800 and 1,000.
In the announcement made today at the white house, nothing was added to the bare statement. The marine force has been in Nicaragua since 1926.
President Hoover said today that his Haitian commission intends to make a final report within the week on the steps necessary for a gradual reestablishment of self-government in the island republic.
The president said those would be in addition to those already arranged by the commission, which has provided for a provisional president in the office May 15 and to sit until the Haitian congress is elected. It is the fall, at which time it will constitutionally elect a new president.
