MEMORIAL FUND IS DONATED FOR CEMETERY WORK

(News-Review Douglas County Special.)
GLENDALE, March 25.—The Soldiers' Memorial association voted to donate at a meeting held for the purpose of winding up its affairs at the city hall last Saturday evening. Before doing this a cash balance of approximately \$100 and a number of wooden benches, property of the association, were by vote turned over to a newly formed Glendale Cemetery association. And so ends a chapter of endeavor that accomplished a worthy purpose even though it fell very much short of the dream that brought it into existence.

The Soldiers' Memorial association was organized shortly after the close of the World war largely through the efforts of J. J. Campbell, then editor of a weekly Glendale newspaper. He envisioned a community building that should serve as a fitting memorial to Glendale's soldier dead. This building should have a large assembly hall with stage, to be used for all sorts of community affairs, also to have gymnasium, dressing rooms, showers, rest rooms, reading rooms, pool rooms and every thing needed to make it the real community center. The money for this he planned to raise by giving a series of home talent plays and by other local endowments. A number of plays were given but the net profits did not accumulate very fast, although augmented by dues and subscriptions to the association he had organized to put his idea over, so a change was made in his plans. Instead of a building it was decided to erect a monument to serve as a soldiers' memorial. This was done. May 30, 1921, saw a fine large granite monument unveiled in a triangular plot of ground near the entrance to the Mounts cemetery. On a large bronze plaque on the face of the granite were inscribed the names of Glendale's sons who had made the supreme sacrifice. Every man, woman and child who helped build it may well be proud of the result of their efforts.

ADVERTISING OLYMPIC GAMES

Wyckoff, who is expected to be one of the outstanding stars of the games, promised to place it on the new Durant 6-14 he is driving.

New automobile plates, based on the "home town plate" idea which has enabled thousands of motorists to decorate their cars with the names of the cities in which they live, has been applied to the advertising campaign of the 1932 Olympic games, which are to be held in Los Angeles.

It is the first time in the history of these historic athletic contests, in which the star amateur athletes of the nations of the world compete, that they have been held in the west.

According to word received here today by L. R. Chambers of the Roseburg Durant Co., local Durant dealer, attractive plates have been prepared and those interested in the success of the games are being asked to attach them to their cars.

"Frank Wyckoff, champion sprinter, who is expected to be an important member of the American team, recently received his plate from C. D. McPhail, assistant general manager of Van Fleet-Durkee, Inc., coast wide service station operating organization, which company had obtained a number of these plates to use on cars of its officials," said Mr. Chambers.

In his presentation talk, McPhail asserted: "Van Fleet-Durkee is doing this as a contribution to ward the success of the Olympic games. I am delighted to give Wyckoff the plate I had intended to use on my own car."

The sprinter said he would lose no time in attaching it to the new Durant six-cylinder sport roadster he is driving.

The plates are attractive. They carry a pair of wings embracing the numerals 1932 and bearing the words "Olympic Games" while below is the word "California."

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TODAY'S MARKETS

(Associated Press Local Wire)
PORTLAND, March 26.—Demand for high grade butter continues to be strong and as a result prices were firm with a higher tendency indicated. In some instances, premiums were added to have been paid.

Butter prices were unchanged with the market going into recess. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland branch of the United States department of agriculture says:

Trading on the wholesale fruit and vegetable market continues active with liberal supplies and slightly lower prices characterizing some commodities. Asparagus is weak. Potatoes are strong. Tomato supplies are increasing, and prices are a bit lower. Bananas are cheaper than they have been in several weeks, due in part to active competition between wholesalers. Dealers are paying 4 to 6¢ per lb. for their bananas.

The potato market has registered strength and higher prices at practically all northern shipping districts during the last several days and movements high as 1.00¢ per bushel have not affected this tendency. Hay was active at Yakima yesterday, \$9.95 per ton for combinations.

Prices to retailers: Fresh extra, 26¢; standard, 25¢; fresh medium, 24¢. Prices to wholesalers 2¢ under price to retailers.

Butter: Extra, 10¢; standard, 9¢; medium, 8¢. Prices to wholesalers 2¢ under price to retailers.
