FORESTS DEVELOP RAPIDLY IN PAST QUARTER CENTURY

Aggregate Total Area Now 160 Million Acres in 150 Units; Trails, Roads Built.

Employees Increased From 734 to 2710—Much Aid Given to Upbuilding of Communities.

Marked expansion in the public use of the national forests and in the protection and development of the forest resources was noted in a review of the growth of the government's forestry work in the last quarter century, issued today by the forest service, U. S. department of agriculture.

When the forest service took charge of the old-time "forest reserves" in 1905, they numbered 60 with an area of approximately 59 million acres. The area is now 160 million acres, embraced in 150 national forests.

In 25 years of administration the work of physical development of the national forests has progressed continuously. In 1905 there were no fire towers or lookout stations. Today, 331 are maintained. A total of 1186 public camp grounds have been improved in the 25-year period. Since 1907 the mileage of national forest roads has been extended from 330 to 16,730. Forest trails have increased from 6644 to 47,175 miles. Mileage of telephone line built for fire protection and administration purposes increased from 539 to 35,925.

Receipts of the "forest reserves" in 1905 amounted to \$55,600, all for timber sold. Receipts last year totaled \$6,299,802. Of this more than \$4,000,000 was from the sale of timber, to be cut under forest service supervision on a sustained or continuous "crop" basis.

The appropriation for the forest service for the fiscal year 1905 was \$20,276. Funds available for forest service work during the current fiscal year amounted to more than \$24,000,000 of which about \$11,500,000 is for extending and improving the national forest road and trail system and for other national forest improvements. Approximately \$1,400,000 is for cooperation with the states in giving fire protection aid to private forest lands. About \$1,400,000, representing 25 per cent of the national forest receipts, is turned over to the states for road and school purposes. Road development and the stabilization of forest-using industries have played no small part in the upbuilding of communities in a national forest region. In the last 25 years, the forest service finds:

Livestock grazed under permit on the national forests increased from 1,400,000 head in 1905 to 7,944,000 in 1929. Special use permits in force on the national forests registered a gain in 25 years of more than 1100 per cent—from 309 in 1905 to 33,310 this year.

There was no record of the number of national forest visitors in 1905. In the latest year for which records are available, 25,000,000 persons visited the forests.

The forest service began work in 1905 with 734 employees. The number has increased to 2,710 in the quarter century.

PORTLAND VOTES MONEY TO CHECK RECALL PETITION

(Associated Press Local Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., March 26.—The city council today voted unanimously to furnish the city auditor with sufficient funds to check the petitions for recall of Mayor George Baker and the four city commissioners.

The city auditor explained that he would be unable to check the more than 100,000 names within five days in order that the recall election could be held with the primary election May 16.

The recall petitions started after the Portland Electric Power company boosted the street car fare from eight to 10 cents without opposition from the city council and the public service commission.

SEATTLE AND LONDON RECORD EARTHQUAKE

(Associated Press Local Wire) SEATTLE, March 26.—An earthquake, starting at 9:56 p. m. yesterday, which lasted approximately an hour was recorded in the University of Washington seismograph. The quake was about 1,900 miles from Seattle but scientists were

unable to determine the direction from this city.

LONDON, March 26.—A considerable earthquake was reported at New Observatory today. The first impulse was received at 7:32 a. m. The record indicated that the epicenter was in southwest China.

WILLIS FINED FOR FOULING DIXON

(Associated Press Local Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., March 25.—The Portland boxing commission today fined "Cowboy Jack" Willis, Los Angeles middleweight, \$100 but preferred no charges after the fight here last night in which George Dixon, Portland colored boxer, was given the nod when Willis struck him a low one in the groin. Dixon was given the decision in the third round of a scheduled 10-round affair.

CANADA ERECTING LIQUOR EXPORT BAN

OTTAWA, Ont., March 26.—The liquor export bill which grants the government authority to refuse clearances to liquor shipments destined for the United States was passed yesterday by the house of commons by a vote of 173 to 11. The bill now goes to the senate.

J. R. NUTT MAY BE NEXT REPUBLICAN DIRECTOR

CLEVELAND, March 26.—Recent reports that Joseph R. Nutt, prominent Cleveland banker, was to be named national chairman of the republican party, were followed yesterday by his resignation as president of the Union Trust company, one of the largest banks in the middle west.

Nutt has denied the reports that he would become republican chairman. He is now treasurer of the republican national committee.

DRAWS EIGHT MONTHS FOR BREAKING DRY LAW

PORTLAND, Ore., March 26.—A. A. Thorhaven, Curry county farmer, was sentenced to 8 months in Multnomah county jail when a jury in Federal Judge McNary's court yesterday found the defendant guilty of liquor law violations. Mrs. Flossie Thorhaven, wife, was acquitted of charges on the same indictment.
