After a day of pounding out monotonous typewriter songs or taking reams of hectic dictation in unintelligible hieroglyphics with your head wreathed in halos of tobacco smoke—to come home to this!

ANTLERS PICTURE NEW TRIUMPH FOR TALKING MOVIES

If you traveled across the continent to New York, bought a \$5.00 ticket to a Ziegfeld revue and found your way to the theatre, you still couldn't see a better show than is in Roseburg right now.

That show is "Rio Rita" which opened at the Antlers last night before a capacity house.

"Rio Rita" in actuality is a musical revue and furthermore it is a Ziegfeld musical revue. In all probability it is the biggest screen production ever to be shown in Roseburg.

When the audience wasn't gasping at the spectacular sequences last night it was roaring at the comic scenes. And if there ever was comedy and spectacle on the screen it is in "Rio Rita." Bert Wheeler and Robert Woolsey, who created the comedy roles in which they appear, made every body laugh, pause and laugh some more. They were so good, in fact, that their acting almost overshadowed that of the two stars, Bebe Daniels and John Boles.

The stars, however, made a place for themselves by their superb singing. Boles, heralded as the screen's premier tenor, certainly lives up to his reputation and Miss Daniels proves that she has a real singing voice.

From the full chorus numbers with complete orchestral accompaniment to the "whispering" song the tone qualities are accurately and pleasingly preserved.
