

STRONGER PADLOCK LAW MEETS FAVOR

(Associated Press Special Wire)
WASHINGTON, March 28.—The first of the national law enforcement commission's recommendations to strengthen the prohibition laws was approved today by the house judiciary committee when it favorably reported the Christopher bill to authorize restriction on absentee owners of speaking engagements and other nuisances.

The committee also considered the Stobbs bill to modify the Jones law to define minor offenses

of the dry law and to fix the maximum penalty for them at six months and a fine of \$500. There are three other measures recommended by the Wickersham commission before the committee.

More Road Money
The Colton bill authorizing the appropriation of \$30,000,000 for federal highway aid in the fiscal years 1931-1932-1933 was approved today by the house public roads committee.

Under the measure \$5,000,000 will be added to the sum already provided for 1931, while the remainder would be expended during the next two years.

In the expenditure of any amount more than \$7,500,000 the secretary of agriculture, who would administer the fund, would be required to give preference to projects on highway systems already receiving federal aid.

STATE ROAD BONDS REST ON U. S. "IF"

PORTLAND, Ore., March 28.—The state highway commission announced today that bonds in the amount of \$1,500,000 will be issued when and if the proposed increase in federal aid and forest money is appropriated by congress. This sum will be required to match the increased funds expected.

Commissioners said, however, that no new projects are contemplated as the money has already been allocated on a tentative program agreed on by the state commission, representatives of the federal bureau of public roads and the forest service.

STUDENTS ACCUSED OF EGG THROWING

Walter Sherman, of Glendale, and Don Sunderland, of Mist, both students at Pacific university, Forest Grove, were arrested Wednesday night and held without bail as a result of a student fracas at a medicine show. A group of students broke up the show by hurling a few ripe eggs. Sherman and Sunderland returned to the show after the main group had departed, and were arrested immediately. No eggs were found in their possession, and according to reports from Forest Grove there has been no proof submitted that they were implicated in the affair. Considerable criticism has resulted over their being held in jail without a formal charge being made against them.

WINS PRAISE FOR VIOLIN PLAYING

Gilbert Walter, a brother of Mrs. W. Culp, of this city, is a member of the Grants Pass high school orchestra, which is attracting much attention in the southern part of the county.
