THE SAGE OF MODERN GREECE

The Athenians of today do not pride themselves on their ancestors; rather do they find it likelier to see themselves constantly represented in bas-reliefs and on vases; but one cannot blame the descendants of a great man if they object to being incessantly reminded of their progenitor.

This was the first subject I broached when I met the present ruler of the country. His quick reply was: "It is certain that we possess the bad characteristics of the old Greeks, but do we possess the good ones? That is the question." In this response and the shy smile which accompanied it one had a glimpse of the ironical side of the man.

This is the trait one first notices; for while he wears on his head a curious double-peaked black silk cap, as though to shield the aristocrat, one feels that over his face there hangs invitingly a jester's mask. I have only once before seen such a clean-cut head. It was that of Bernard Shaw, whom Venizelos resembles, at least in age.

Venizelos's head, like Shaw's, is a blend of whites and pinks; but the statesman has the more delicate nose, the thinner the higher forehead, and this, too, is symbolic. The striking thing about both men is their gleaming health, although Venizelos is always reported sick when he gives up office. In Shaw's case such contingencies do not arise. If Venizelos wrote he would certainly write nothing but comedies, and if Shaw wielded political power he would extricate himself from political difficulties in the same quick and like manner as Venizelos—though both are actuated by fundamental principles to which they sincerely adhere.—Emil Ludwig in the New York Times, Jan. 12, 1930.
