GLENDAL CHURCH SHOWS BIG GAIN DURING PAST YEAR

Annual Business Meeting Given Over to Reports and Election of New Officers.

Large Membership Gain in Both Church and Bible School Achieved During Year.

GLENDAL, March 29.—Following a covered dish supper served by the Ladies Aid society at the Presbyterian church basement, the annual business meeting of the members of the Glendale Presbyterian church was held Thursday evening.

The reports of the Ladies Aid society's activities were well received. The church interior has been repainted and a number of improvements made during the past year through the efforts of the ladies. They now plan securing a new church carpet and a new water tank for the church kitchen range.
