

COUNTY'S JUNIOR LEAGUE BASEBALL SEASON OUTLINED

Three Divisions Formed to Participate in Series Under Guidance of Legion Post.

Games to Begin Middle of April; Sportsmanship Building on Clean Basis Is Aim.

The American Legion committee on Junior League baseball consisting of A. B. Carey, B. E. Larson, Rudolph Ritzman, H. H. Turner and B. A. Britton, met Friday at the senior high school and made plans for the coming season.

The county is to be divided into three divisions for the baseball contests. Glendale, Canyonville, Riddle, Days Creek, Myrtle Creek and Canas Valley comprise the south division; Drain, Yoncalla, Oakland, Sutherlin and Wilbur make up the north division while Glide, Roseburg and Melrose are included in the central section.

Rudolph Ritzman has direct charge of the south section, A. B. Carey the central and H. H. Turner and B. E. Larson the north end of the county. Each section chief will select such men as he wishes to associate with himself in the work from the communities coming within his area.

Series Start in April
It was planned to begin a series of games within each division during the second week of April. Each district will play to decide the district championship. Then the three winners will meet to decide the county championship.

This will probably be worked out on a percentage basis and two or three games will be played by each team. While this championship series is being played, another series of games will be played within the districts among the remaining teams. If time permits the three championship teams from this series will play off for the county consolation championship, the winning team being given an opportunity to play the county championship team for their crown, the championship.

State Title Eyed
During the time that all these games are being played the men in charge will keep looking the boys over with the idea of making up the best team possible from among members of all teams to represent this county against the other districts in this part of the state. It is hoped that the local post American Legion team as selected, will be able to win the championship of the state. It is with that idea in mind that the

committee is getting the program under way just as soon as possible so that the picked players will be given considerable practice before called to meet some other district.

Roseburg boys are somewhat behind in practice and are being given a chance to limber up on Friday field.

For Good Sportsmanship
The American Legion, in promoting this Junior League, realizes that not all teams can win championship honors. However, every player can win that which is of more importance—the spirit of fair play, loyalty, team work, obedience, gameness and democracy. The men on the committee have been picked because of their qualities of good sportsmanship and ability to keep the true purpose of the baseball program before the boys by precept and example.

The whole Junior League baseball program is based on the theory that the principles of good sportsmanship are closely related to the principles of good citizenship and that by teaching a boy to be a good sportsman in his youth he will make a better American in his adult life. Baseball was chosen by the American Legion because it is America's own game and because it gives such a wide opportunity to teach good sportsmanship.

ACTRESS SUICIDES WHEN DIET FAILS TO SLASH WEIGHT

NEW YORK, March 31.—Miss Allyn King, former musical comedy star, is dead and Broadway today traced the series of events which ended in her suicide back to a contract which demanded that she keep a luscious figure to hold her job.

She died yesterday from injuries suffered when she jumped from the 50-story apartment of her aunt in Greenwich village.

In 1921 Miss King weighed 145 pounds. Then the boyish figure became the vogue on Broadway. She reduced to 115 pounds.

She signed a contract which read:

"It is expressly made a part of this agreement, and is an essential part thereof, that if at any time you should, during the term of the said agreement, increase in weight more than 15 pounds or decrease in weight more than 10 pounds, or let the dimensions of any part of your figure vary more than one-half inch from the following: Weight 115 pounds, neck 12 1/2 inches, bust 34 inches, upper arm 11, lower arm 7 1/2, waist 26, hips 34, thigh 18, calf 12, ankle 8 1/2, then and in that event we shall have the right to cancel this contract upon giving you one week's notice."

Miss King lived up to her contract six years. To do it she resorted to various diets and remedies. She went without food, without sleep, without water and took reducing pellets.

In 1928 her health failed and she was sent to a sanatorium where she remained for nearly two years.

Shortly before she died she explained her act by saying:

"I did it because I will never return to Broadway."

She was 39 years old.

fantry, Vancouver barracks, had perished.

Possibility that the disaster had claimed another life was seen in reports from Vancouver that Lee Seigle, 1009 West Tenth street, Vancouver, was still missing. He was a passenger on the Swan, standing well forward at the moment of the crash where the impact was greatest.

Two boats and grappling equipment from the Portland harbor patrol reached here this morning to aid in the search for the bodies.

Some Swim to Safety
Dozens of persons were buried into the murky waters of the Columbia as the two boats collided. Dozens of others walked over a gangplank to the sandbar when the barge lodged against it, while others escaped death by swimming more than three quarters of a mile to either the Washington or Oregon shore of the river. Tugs towed the barge to the St. Helens harbor where a survey showed a great hole had been torn in its fore section. The Davenport,

under its own power, also berthed at St. Helens.

Contradictory Statements
Various versions of the collision were given. R. J. Belland, captain and owner of the Swan, said: "I know my lights were in the wrong. We did not see the Davenport until she was upon us and then it was too late."

Isaac Turpa, Columbia river pilot in charge of the Davenport's downriver trip, said: "The Swan didn't have regulation lights. They were supposed to have colored lights visible for two miles. I saw a small light some distance down the river and supposed it to be a small fishing craft."

William Neilson, captain of the Davenport, said: "I was in my bunk when we struck. All I can say is that our lights are standard and our crew competent."

Orchestra Morale Good
Rescued passengers told of how the orchestra congregated in a corner while the barge was slipping down stream after the crash and endeavored to quiet the panic stricken with strains of familiar tunes. Others told of how passengers lifted their voices in hymns which were pierced by the screams of the frightened.

A railroad company sent a special train from Portland to St. Helens, equipped with nurses and physicians. Some of the injured were returned to Vancouver aboard the train.

Larson Crops Expert
CORVALLIS, Ore., March 31.—J. E. Larson, drowned in the Swan disaster, was one of the pioneer extension service men of

Oregon. He served throughout Oregon as farm crops specialist from 1914 to 1917, and later as Polk county agricultural agent, Oregon state college authorities said today.

A brother, Ray Larson, is county agent of Malheur county. Another brother, Joe Larson, is manager of the Marshfield Cooperative creamery.

KILLER DIES IN CHAIR
