

EXPERT GROWER OF MELONS BUYS LAND ON CURRY ESTATE

Orlando Moore, of Visalia, California, a widely known melon experimenter, who has produced several varieties of watermelons, has purchased the 15-acre tract formerly belonging to W. F. Wright and located on the Curry estate. Mr. Moore, who is referred to in California as "the Lather Burbank of the watermelon industry," is interested in melon growing and has secured the land for that purpose, it being one of the few remaining tracts near the city. The deal was made through the E. G. Kingwell agency.

Mr. Moore's latest melon introduction is the "Cannon Ball Klondyke," a melon that averages about 14 pounds in weight, with a very thin rind, blood-red center and few black seeds. It has very small ribs and apple-like ends. It is about a week to two weeks earlier than the Klondyke.

Mr. Moore's family will remain in California for a few months, as his sons, Ralph and Harlan, are engaged in the nursery business, which they are hoping to close out in time to join their father in the late summer.

He stated that he is greatly surprised to find the county so little known. Garden Valley bottom lands, in his opinion, are very valuable, and if average production is as reported, then it is possible to bring in a great many growers from California.

Mr. Kingwell contacted Mr. Moore through the extensive advertising campaign being carried on in California by the state chamber of commerce.

cent during the months of 1929, in which peace time production reached high records in 24 industrial centers.

The federal government's unemployment program, Green outlined under three separate headings: fact finding, industrial measures, and remedial measures.

Wants Specific Census

He urged that the unemployment census, authorized by congress in connection with the decennial census, give "the total picture of unemployment" by establishing between part time work and idleness. He also urged a federal agency to supplement this periodic information, asserting that present methods do not give the full measure of unemployment.

A major industrial measure, Green proposed stabilization, pointing out instances in which it had been accomplished with cooperation between workers and industries.

He also urged recognition by industries of what he called the vital partnership which wage earners bring to a productive undertaking.

Green endorsed federal employment service "to connect workers wanting jobs with work opportunities."

Workers out of jobs, he said, have no money to pay fees of private agencies. Workers displaced by technological changes need special employment counsel and vocational training opportunities, he added, and there should be job analysis agencies to establish job requirements in order to find work which older men can do.
