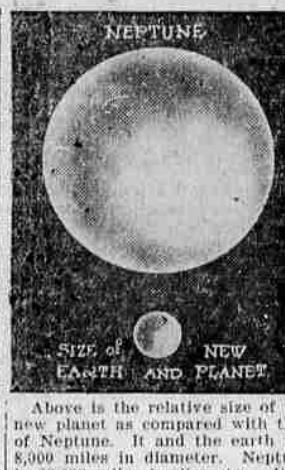

Above is the relative size of the new planet as compared with that of Neptune. It and the earth are 8,000 miles in diameter. Neptune is 36,000 miles in diameter. It is fifty times as far from the sun as is our earth, so the sunlight must look to it like a pale moon. Its speed of revolution is one-twentieth that of the earth. While the earth revolves about the sun in one year, it takes the new planet about 300 years to revolve about the earth. Winter on the new planet, or summer would be about 75 years long.

LOBBY INQUIRY CREATES ANGLE OF SPECULATION

Hoover's Expected Veto of Muscle Shoals Measure May Enlarge Boom for Roosevelt.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Speculation on the attitude of President Hoover and Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York on power was heard today before the senate lobby committee, the opinion being advanced that the president would veto a bill calling for government operation of Muscle Shoals and that the New York governor might be urged as a democratic candidate for president on a platform calling for government ownership of power. A memorandum prepared by J. W. Worthington, secretary of the Tennessee River Improvement association, was placed in the record which predicted that the chief executive would veto a bill calling for operation by the government of the power project in Alabama. W. G. Waldo, publisher of the Tennessee river association, was on the stand today. Governor Roosevelt's name was brought in to the hearing by a telegram that Waldo had sent to Worthington last September. It described Josephus Daniels, Raleigh, N. C., publisher of the "Muscle Shoals" paper, as favoring government ownership of the Muscle Shoals. "Making progress here but not with exsecratory," the telegram said. "He is irrevocably committed to Norris policy and may advocate Roosevelt for next democratic candidate for president on a government ownership and operation of power platform." W. Bell, president of the American Cyanamid company, testified that his company had spent \$168,750 in efforts to lease Muscle Shoals from the government. Bell testified that Charles Evans Hughes, now chief justice of the United States, had been employed to pass upon the constitutionality of the contract by which the Cyanamid company proposed to lease Muscle Shoals. Hughes, the witness said, advised that the contract be embodied in an act of congress instead of being incorporated through a government official.

a government official. The contract is contained in the Wright Muscle Shoals bill.

STATE PRESS COMMENT

Tax on Billboards—(Portland Oregonian)

More lower to the good fight band with which the governor of New Jersey signed recently the bill which imposes a round tax on billboards in that commonwealth, but it will be a mistake to assume that taxation alone can settle the issue of whether and how far billboard advertising devices shall be permitted to obscure and to debase our scenery. Though the obvious purpose of measures like the New Jersey law is prohibitive rather than fiscal, it remains true that they will fail unless there is also a manifest cooperation on the part of the buyers of advertised goods.

The arguments against billboard advertising as it is commonly managed are too well known to need repetition here. That they have impressed the makers of an important number of well-known products had been clearly shown by recent announcements concerning publicity policies. It goes without saying that no institution having goods to sell wishes to incur the prejudice of many prospective customers. This is the consumer's opportunity if he regards protection of the scenery as worth while—opportunity to exhibit practical gratitude for real benefits.

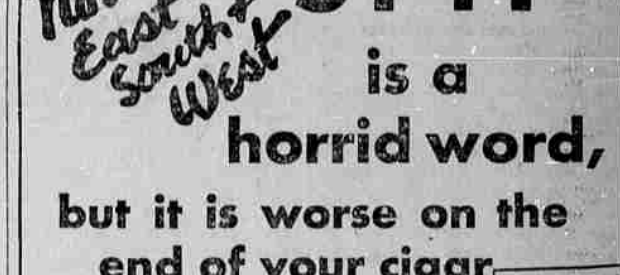
