TILSON REVIEWS ACHIEVEMENTS OF HOOVER'S REGIME

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Majority leader Tilson of the house is sponsor for the assertion that democratic reviews of President Hoover's first year have been marked by "such a concealment of facts as to make it appear that there has been a studied effort at misrepresentation."

"So that the situation may be clarified," he said in a statement issued for publication yesterday, "I list here some of the high lights of the legislative proposals recommended by President Hoover and passed by congress."

He enumerated six items: tax reduction, farm relief, the public buildings bill, congressional reapportionment, road improvement legislation and the act establishing a permanent federal radio commission.

The roads and building measures, he said, represent the government's contribution to business stability and to the comprehensive program "which President Hoover proposed so promptly and energetically after the stock market crash last fall as a means of restoring confidence and alleviating unemployment."

The farm relief bill passed last summer in conformity with the president's recommendations, he said, has "already brought help and courage to agriculture."

He saw an illustration of the board's ability to assist the farmers in "the recent embryo wheat panic" which, if left alone, he said, "might have precipitated a major disturbance in commodity prices generally."

ASTORIA BANK PROMOTERS APPEAL FROM DECISION

SALEM, Ore., April 2.—Directors of the proposed Bank of Astoria have appealed to the state banking board from a decision of State Bank Superintendent A. A. Schramm rejecting their application for a charter to organize the bank. An application was first made for a national charter under the name of the United National Bank of Astoria, but this was rejected by the comptroller of the currency.

EARTH'S FAIRYLAND SUPREME

In the most primitive spot in all Africa and near the continent's geographic center is the Parc National Albert of the Belgian Congo. Created by Albert, King of the Belgians, in 1925, four years after the searchlight of interest had been turned upon this almost unknown region by Carl Akeley, it became a sanctuary for all wild life—plant and animal. Today, enlarged tenfold, the 500,000 acres border two great equatorial lakes—Lake Edward and Lake Kivu. Its vast plains and valleys are watered by deep tropic rivers. Its uplands reach their ultimate peaks in the smoke masses of active volcanoes, desolate of life from jagged ramparts to molten crater, or in the clouds of their ancient sisters—for long ages extinct, and now pulsating with life from rolling green foothills along densely forested massifs to snowy summits. Carl Akeley called this ancient volcanic wonderland the "abode of the gnomes and fairies." He believed it the most beautiful spot in all the world.

The center of life interest in the Parc is the triangle composed of the three old volcanoes, Mikeno, Karisimbi and Bisoke. Here, from the palm-fringed equatorial rivers which skirt their base to flower-filled alpine heights, are all the zones of climate of the earth. Here throughout recent ages have been born the very offspring of Flora and Fauna. In the midst of rich, varied and almost unreal vegetation is the home of many mammals, small and great. Elephants break out wide, deep trails as they travel along the mountain slopes. Herds of buffalo leave a narrower track as they forage between lower forest and alplands.—Mary L. Jobe Akeley, in the New York Times, Jan. 26, 1930.
