**STATE ASYLUM TO REJECT "FEEBLE MINDED" PERSONS**

SALEM, Ore., April 3.—Dr. R. E. Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital for the insane here, will have no objection to the admission of feeble-minded persons, he told the state board of control today that the practice of Oregon county courts in sending this class of persons to the institution is not so much inability of the county officials to distinguish between the insane and the feeble-minded as it is a desire to get the latter off their hands. He said he did not propose to allow the hospital to become a "dumping ground" for the feeble-minded, and the board promised to back him up in this policy.

Dr. R. D. Byrd, superintendent of the institution for the feeble minded, reported that that institution is crowded beyond capacity with a waiting list of 50 males. The necessity of turning applicants away amounts in some degree for the county courts sending them to the insane hospital.

W. H. Hallie, superintendent of the boys' training school, told the board that twice as many boys are being committed to that institution as ever before. His request that a third parole officer be employed was granted by the board.

Superintendent Steiner was authorized to increase the salaries of four specialists on the hospital staff from \$175 to \$250 a month. Living expenses are provided for the physicians in addition to their salaries.

**ARREST OF NO. 9 IN LOAN FRAUD CASE EXPECTED**

PORTLAND, Ore., April 3.—Investigation of the alleged Guaranty & Loan company mail fraud case, in which 25 Pacific northwest banks were said by federal authorities here to have lost about \$50,000 through purchasing assorted worthless promissory notes, was at a halt today while government agents awaited the ninth of a series of arrests on indictments returned by the local February federal grand jury.

C. I. Wadsworth of Elko, Nevada, was said to be the last person sought in connection with the case.
