STATE HIGHWAY
COMMISSION WILL
LIMIT LOG LOADS

(News-Review Douglas County Special)
GLENDALE, April 5.—No trucking will be permitted over state highways where loads exceed the maximum load limits established by the Oregon legislature, was the emphatic statement made by C. E. Gates, state highway commissioner, at the meeting held here Thursday afternoon to discuss load limits for trucks. Gates intimated that it was a policy of the highway commission to reduce load limits allowed by the law wherever conditions warranted such action.

C. E. Gates, state highway commissioner, Lieutenant Nichols, E. B. Thurber and H. Hoxie, representing the state traffic bureau, met with a committee of truckmen and heard their complaints Thursday.

Representatives of the state traffic department emphasized the fact that present legal load limits are based entirely on weight. They also recognized the fact that log loads apparently of the same size in quantity vary considerably in weight because of difference in timber. The truckers asked for a load limit based on log scale. This was tentatively agreed to by the traffic officers who will work out a schedule of truck load limits based on log scale which will be placed in effect for a trial shortly.

In order to get data on which to base these load limit schedules, the traffic officers will weigh and make an exact check on all truck log loads here this coming week.

Mrs. Kennedy was 78 years old, having been born January 14, 1852, of Oregon pioneer parents on a donation claim near Harrisburg. She resided in Glendale a major part of her life. For some 10 years prior to 1909, she conducted the old Glendale hotel on the site of the present Nerbas apartments.

BERG SHOW REAL
FIGHTING STUFF IN
DEFEATING GLICK

NEW YORK, April 5.—Jack (Kid) Berg, English lightweight, has given an amazing display of courage for the benefit of the same metropolitan fight fans who watched Phil Scott, British heavyweight, take what they thought was an "out" in his battle with Otto Von Porat here last December.

Floored twice by low punches in the eighth round of his ten-round bout with Joe Glick at Madison Square garden last night, Berg got up to carry the fight to his opponent and earn the unanimous decision of the judges and referee.

Berg, a front-rank contender for the lightweight title, at the same time, of the somewhat synthetic junior welterweight crown, was leading on points after the first seven rounds. Glick had put up a great fight in the first three rounds but tired badly thereafter.

In the eighth Berg was smashed to the floor by a left hook that was palpably low. As Berg came to his feet at the count of seven, Glick smashed him again with another low left. Berg got up and flew at Glick like a wildcat and soon had the one-time Brooklyn pants presser groggy and bleeding from cuts over both eyes.

Berg's gallant performance caused some ringside observers to recall Scott's performance in the same ring when he was struck by a low but apparently harmless left by Von Porat and stayed down until the referee disqualified the Norwegian on a foul.

The Roseburg senior high school baseball team defeated Glendale 3 to 1 in a seven-inning game played at Finlay field last night. Roseburg garnered three hits and Glide three. Roseburg had two errors and Glide 4. Hoffman scored a home run on a fast grounder that went through shortstop for an error and rolled into deep left field.
