Nebraska Drops Bryan's Bank Guaranty Law—Experiment Leaves State Fund Deeply in "Red"—Fails in Other Places Also.

LINCOLN, Neb., April 7.—(A. P.)—When Governor Arthur J. Weaver of Nebraska recently signed a bill repealing the state's bank guaranty law, it marked the virtual passing of a favorite principle of William Jennings Bryan.

It was one of the chief issues of the last two Bryan campaigns. Out of it grew more than a dozen state bank guaranty laws, modeled on the same plan, in as many states. Only one is left, that of the state of Mississippi.

Even as late as three years ago agitation in Iowa for a similar law was strong enough to be one of the most bitterly contested issues before the legislature.

The Nebraska guaranty fund was conceded to be "in the red" between \$16,000,000 and \$20,000,000.

THREE BOMBINGS IN TWO DAYS JAR AREAS IN CHICAGO

(Associated Press Leased Wire) CHICAGO, April 7.—Two explosions early today wrecked a garage, destroyed 35 automobiles and shook eight people, four of them children, from their beds; another yesterday, a bombing attributed to a south side beer war, blew a policeman off his feet.

On the northwest side, a 20-car garage was destroyed when a gasoline storage tank exploded, shattering windows for blocks about. Thirty-five cars, one of them owned by Alderman G. M. Rosczynski, who lives across the street, were demolished. A negro watchman had just left the garage for breakfast.

On the southwest side, a two-story apartment was damaged and members of two families rocked from their beds by a bomb explosion in the entrance. Attorney David Alexander, former assistant corporation counsel, occupied one of the floors but could disclose no motive for the bomb.

Patrolman James Folsom, on duty and going home for his Sunday rest, passed a beer place in the stockyards district just as a bomb was tossed from an automobile. The explosion knocked him down and wrecked the building front.
