

DOUGLAS COUNTY TURKEY BREEDERS TO MEET APRIL 10

The annual meeting of the Douglas County Turkey Breeders' association will be held at Oakland Thursday, April 10, at which time the regular business of the organization will be taken care of. An interesting and educational program has been arranged for presentation in connection with the meeting. H. E. Cosby, extension poultryman of the state college, and Dr. W. T. 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curing of the salt was effected. Opens Law Breach. Immediately after coming from the water he issued a statement to the press in which he said: "Now that a technical or ceremonial breach of the salt law has been committed such a course is open to any one who will risk prosecution. He may manufacture salt wherever he wishes and wherever convenient." Continuing, the statement urged villagers everywhere to break the salt law, and then said: "It should be made clear to the villagers that the breach is open and that such conduct is in no way stealthy." In conclusion he said: "This war against the salt tax should be continued during national week, that is, up to April 12. Those engaged in this sacred work should devote themselves to vigorous propaganda for a boycott against foreign cloth and the prohibition of liquor. I am preparing a message now for the women of India, who I am convinced more and more, can make a larger contribution than men towards attainment of independence."

Prisoners Decline Bail. Gandhi's son, Ram Das Gandhi, was arrested at Bulmadi village in the Choral district for gathering salt, and was taken with four volunteers to Surat, where they were offered bail on their own recognizances by the magistrate. They refused and were held for trial Tuesday.

At Viragam, a large town 40 miles west of Ahmedabad, the police arrested Hanil Kothari, one of Gandhi's lieutenants, and 55 volunteers. Kothari later was sentenced to a fine of 50 rupees (about \$180) or six months' simple imprisonment.

and the body, near the armpit. Probe to Be Complete. W. Eden of Portland, department of justice operative, and Detective John Goltz of Portland reached Eugene Saturday night. The party led by Eden, which included W. W. Brant, coroner; Sheriff H. L. Bowen, Deputy Lee Brown, Foster Steele and C. C. Olsen, Cascade forest officials, and Alta King, district attorney. Major John D. Guthrie of Portland, assistant district forester, was here assisting in getting the investigation started. We are going to see this thing through a complete investigation," he said. "Nelson MacDuff was one of the oldest and finest men in the service."

Coroner Brantletter holds to the accidental death theory. Detectives have found the discharged shell from MacDuff's service pistol, but not the bullet which pierced the forester's head from side to side.

Murder Theory Scouted. PORTLAND, Ore., April 7.—Photographs of finger prints found on the automatic pistol beside the body of Nelson P. MacDuff, supervisor of the Cascade forest, will be developed here later today by police department experts. Detectives do not hold to the murder theory, the opinion being that the met accidental death from his own pistol or that he committed suicide.

MacDuff was found on his back, his left arm stretched beside his body and his service pistol held between the arm and body. He had been shot through the head from side to side. Nearby was an empty cartridge from his Luger pistol. One shell in the gun had been fired. Detectives have been unable to find the bullet that tore through MacDuff's head, and from the wound are unable to tell what caliber bullet killed him.

Examination of the pistol is expected to reveal fingerprints. If they are MacDuff's, no hint will be added to the facts already known. If they are from the hands of some one else, however, it will

DAIRYING EXPERT TO BE SPEAKER AT KIWANIS MEETING

Reaper Invented Century Ago in Virginia

State to Celebrate Anniversary of "Contraption" Devised by Cyrus McCormick.

RAPHAINE, Va., April 7.—A little farm shop in the Virginia hills will have an important part in the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the reaper in 1931.

It was there that Cyrus H. McCormick constructed the "contraption" that was to revolutionize agriculture and give to the world cheap bread.

The first reaper was crude, but the principle remains the same in the efficient machines of today.

Celebration of the 100th anniversary will be national and possibly international in its scope.

A model of the first crude machine is preserved in the state museum at Richmond.

Cyrus McCormick was one of the many who toiled on farms, swathing the old-fashioned "cradle" through the wheat on his father's acres in Rockbridge county, Virginia.

He profited by the mistakes of his father, who had sought unsuccessfully to construct a harvesting machine. His father's plan of a machine to be pushed was abandoned.

Instead McCormick adopted a cutting blade on the side. Then followed the device to separate the stalks to place them in cutting position and arms to gather the fallen stalks. The machine floundered along the field, a "loke" to some of the neighbors. But it worked.

The McCormick home lay in the Shenandoah valley, a spot to be known in after years as the "cradle of the Confederacy" because of its productivity.

SENATOR SIMMONS DISCLAIMS RASKOB

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Senator Simmons, democrat, North Carolina, asserted in the senate today his "repudiation" of Chairman Raskob of the democratic national committee in behalf of the democratic party of his state, for contributing money to the association against the prohibition amendment.

"I want the country to know," said the veteran North Carolinian, "that the democrats of my state overwhelmingly disapprove of the chairman of the democratic national committee contributing money to an association whose purpose is to elect wet republicans over dry democrats."

Senator Simmons declined to support the democratic presidential nominee, Alfred E. Smith, in the 1928 election.

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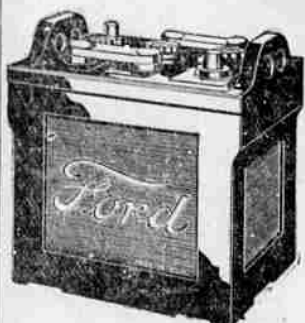
