News Briefs

NEW YORK, April 8.—Envelopes bearing propaganda for the release of Tom Mooney from prison may be sent through the mails, the United States court of appeals unanimously ruled yesterday in reversing a decision of Federal Judge Frank J. Coleman. Mooney is serving a life term with Warren K. Billings, for alleged participation in the bombing of a preparedness day parade in San Francisco in 1916.

PLACERVILLE, Cal., April 8.—Fifteen persons, nine of them children, were ill with trichinosis, a poisoning from parasites in raw pork, as the result of home made salami eaten at a birthday party at Resno, El Dorado county on March 29. Seven of the victims are in a precarious condition.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., April 8.—Samuel B. Lambert of the Lambert Aircraft corporation, of Moline, Ill., was killed yesterday when the airplane which he was piloting fell about a mile south of the airport here.

CONFEREES RESTORE PIG IRON TARIFF (Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, April 8.—The existing duty of \$1.12 a ton of pig iron was restored to the tariff bill yesterday by the congressional conferees.

The rate had been cut to 75 cents by the coalition of democrats and republicans in the senate.

The 75 cent duty was the duty in existing law before it was raised to 50 per cent by presidential proclamation several years ago. The house bill provided for the \$1.12 rate.

The conferees agreed upon the senate reduction in the present levies on plate glass over 34 square inches and reduced a compromise duty of 35 cents a square foot on plate glass containing a wire netting within itself and plate, cylinder, crown and sheet glass, when made into mirrors.

Prof. P. M. Brand, who was to have been the speaker at the Kiwanis noon luncheon today, failed to arrive in time to participate in the program. The program was directed to the dairy industry, being planned to encourage the use of dairy products. J. C. Leedy, Fred Goff, J. F. Bonebrake, Ernest Under and Horace Berg made short talks, stressing the importance of the dairy industry and the need for cutting down the use of substitutes. Douglas county, Mr. Leedy reported, has 6,596 dairy cows. The average production is about \$116 per head annually, which gives an income of about \$756,000. Such an industry, he stated, is worthy of all assistance that can be given it.

BIG ACREAGE NEAR SALEM CHOSEN FOR VEGETABLE TESTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SALEM, Ore., April 8.—Planting of 300 experimental acres of vegetable seeds in the Salem district from the state fairgrounds as far north as Garretts in selected spots for raising of vegetable and garden truck seeds presage development of from 6990 to 10,000 acres of garden lands in this vicinity for that purpose within the next few years, according to plans now being developed.

The trial 300 acres will be used for development of onion, carrot, beet, parsnip, radish, lettuce and similar garden seeds. If the experiments prove successful, work of enlarging the acreage will immediately proceed.

In addition to this class of vegetable seeds to the north of Salem, trial plantings of beans and peas for seed are being made in the Turner, Station and Albany sections south of here and in event these plants work out it is expected around 3000 acres will be the goal for planting of beans and peas for seed purposes for the concern. The beans used are the wax and string beans, not the dry beans raised on such an extensive scale in California.

The company handling this project, at present at least, has no plans in view for flower seed development in this section, this being done in California on an immense scale where the hot weather causes the seeds to cure off better, it is stated. But the climate, state the experimenters, is ideally adapted here for the development of the vegetable seed business along the lines outlined.

The big development is the outgrowth of onion seed experimentation the company has been doing here in previous years. This has been so successful that they decided to try additional experiments.
