strength to the murder theory when she told of having seen a "suspicious looking" man on a road near her cottage last Friday, the day MacDuff disappeared. The man carried a rifle and appeared "mentally deficient," Mrs. Travis said. She declared she is well acquainted in that neighborhood but had never seen the man before.

Authorities began a search for the man immediately following Mrs. Travis' disclosure.

Fatal Bullet Missing
Although officers made a minute search of the thicket in which MacDuff's body was found, no trace of the bullet which crashed through his brain was discovered. The bullet, it was agreed, holds the key to the mystery of whether the supervisor was murdered, or took his own life.

MacDuff's own revolver, of German manufacture, was found under the left arm of the supervisor's body. One cartridge had been discharged. The right arm was crossed over the chest, the left extended on the ground.

Authorities said firearms experts could readily determine whether the bullet, could it be found, was fired from MacDuff's weapon or from some other gun.

The supervisor disappeared last Friday. When he failed to appear for dinner at McKenzie bridge, searching parties were organized. The body was found early Saturday morning.

There was no indication, however, that the breach between the men had been adjusted.

The questioning which caused the exchange between Senator Rank and the Alabama editor to be in line with other queries that Claudius H. Houston answered in his lively testimony about the Muscle Shoals activities. The revelation that money collected by Houston from the Union Carbide association for use by the Tennessee River Improvement association had been used as margin for the purchase of stocks have given rise to rumors that Houston would resign. The commission chairman, however, asserted all the money went eventually to the improvement association of which he was president at the time.

The senate recently passed the Norris bill for government operation of Muscle Shoals, but the measure has yet to be acted on in the house.

Ex-Navy Head Called

Josephus Daniels, long dry and former democratic secretary of the navy, appeared today before the senate lobby committee to tell about an editorial appearing recently in his North Carolina newspaper which demanded that John P. Raskob, democratic national chairman, resign his post because of his opposition to the dry laws. Raskob, who appeared before the lobby committee last Friday, will be heard by the senate committee on the association against the prohibition amendment. He added that one of the purposes of the organization was to elect members of congress who advocated repeal or modification of the prohibition laws.

Senators Walsh, democrat, Montana, and Robinson, republican, Indiana, were the only committee members present. Daniels was called by Robinson.

Robinson asked Daniels if he had ever been a member of the democratic national committee.

"Twenty years," Daniels replied.

Robinson then asked the editorial appearing recently in the Raleigh News and Observer, published by Daniels, which demanded that Raskob resign because of his connection with the association against the prohibition amendment.

The editorial said Raskob had been a member of the Union League club of New York, a republican organization.

"Is he still a member?" Robinson asked.

"I don't know," Daniels answered.

The editorial asserted that Raskob was "more interested in destroying prohibition than in the democratic party."

"Does that editorial express your views?" Robinson inquired.

"One moment," Walsh broke in, "object that."

"Isn't this committee going to let Daniels express his views?" Robinson demanded.

"Not if I can prevent it," Walsh snapped.

"Are the facts stated in this editorial true?" Robinson then asked.

"They are," Daniels answered.

port on ways and means of eliminating the buildings.

The World War Veterans State Aid commission also asked for the investigation of unsanitary conditions existing on Temple street, where several houses are attached on one small septic tank. This matter was also referred to the committee on health and police.

Light Cost Problem

City Engineer Eppstein, who has been investigating the cost of extending the street lighting system to North Jackson, East Oak and South Stephens streets, reported that the cost will amount to about \$140 for each lamp installed. Each section is asking for additional street lights, but the city does not have funds available to make the improvements at this time. However, the matter was referred to a committee to determine if money can be appropriated to make any part of the extension.

More Road Coin Asked

A resolution was adopted, at the request of the League of Oregon cities, asking the legislature to provide a larger share of the road tax money for the municipalities. In former years the cities received 70 per cent of the road money raised inside the city limits, but at the last session of the legislature this was changed to 50 per cent. Due to the heavy expense of maintaining pavements, it was believed that the amount provided for the cities should be increased.

A petition asking for sidewalk construction along Flesher street was referred to the committee on city improvements.

No Coin to Meet Bonds

The city treasurer reported that a bond issue in the sum of \$40,000 comes due in September of this year, and that at present there is no money in the sinking fund to meet the obligation. The city attorney was instructed to investigate and report.

It was decided by the council to restore the city electrical inspector to a salary instead of a fee basis.

To Ice Fountains

The council gave approval to the Chamber of Commerce request for ice boxes in connection with the city drinking fountains. During the summer months the drinking water in the public fountains becomes too warm to be good, and the Chamber of Commerce has petitioned the city to install ice boxes and coils in connection with each fountain.

A committee composed of Councilmen Young, McKean and Wharton was instructed to secure bids for the work and was given power to act in providing for the installation.

two policemen of touring the ward and intimidating voters. Both Jacobson and Klass supported Eller two years ago and were indicted with him.

The election board sent 14 investigators into the "bloody twentieth" ward to watch developments.

Big Vote Expected

The day dawned fair, and promised to stay that way from the opening of the polls at 6 a. m. to their closing, in Chicago, at 5 p. m.; and this was a circumstance, combining with great interest in the republican senatorial contest, calculated to bring out a large vote.

A vote of 800,000 was forecast in Chicago, which has 1,297,055 registered voters. Downstate was not expected to do as well.

Mrs. McCormick, before leaving Chicago yesterday, warned that if there was any effort made here to "steal the election," she would appeal at once to the courts to appoint a special prosecutor and special grand jury to "prosecute all those engaged in this conspiracy."

More watchers were on hand at polling places than at any primary or election of recent years. The estimated total was 60,000, or about 20 to a precinct.

Angles for Black Vote

Mrs. McCormick, 50, the daughter of the late Mark Hanna, is the widow of the late Senator Modell McCormick. It was in 1924 that Deneen gained McCormick's seat by a plurality of less than 6,000 votes.

The campaign reached a high point Sunday night when Mrs. McCormick, at a rally of negro voters, declared her support of Oscar DePriest, negro congressman seeking re-election.

In his Sunday meeting, Deneen charged Mrs. McCormick with "spending large sums of money in every section of the state" and said "there has not been a campaign in Illinois so expensive as the one she is making."

Not once has the question of a woman seeking election as a senator been raised. Mrs. McCormick demonstrated her vote setting ability by leading the field in the race for congressman-at-large two years ago.

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BANK PROMOTERS, DENIED CHARTER, ASSAIL SCHRAM

SALEM, Ore., April 8.—Propo-

nents of the proposed new Bank of Astoria, who have appealed to the state banking board from a decision by State Bank Superintendent Schramm denying them a charter, at a hearing today charged Schramm with prejudice.

Schramm with prejudice. Schramm and J. E. Roman, president of the National Bank of Commerce at Astoria and an opponent of the proposed new charter, protested against Governor Norblad sitting as a member of the board because he was a member of the original group backing the new bank.

Morfe Chessman, spokesman for the applicant group, replied by declaring that Norblad had in no way been connected with the movement since he became governor. The governor also disclaimed any feeling of prejudice. He insisted on his right to sit as a member of the board. At times the meeting threatened to become very heated.

Chessman in a preliminary statement declared that Superintendent Schramm had not conducted a fair and impartial investigation, but that he had expressed his attitude before the application for charter was made.

Before making their application for a state charter the Astoria group applied to the comptroller of the currency for a national charter, but this was withdrawn before being acted upon. While the application was before the comptroller Schramm sent a communication relative to the matter to the comptroller. The applicants declared this communication was designed to injure their chances for a charter because he painted "a dark and dismal picture of Astoria." This Schramm denied. He said his letter to the comptroller "was not voluntary, but was on a form sent him by the comptroller to get his opinion which, he said, was according to regular practice. As to having stated his attitude before application for the state charter was made Schramm said he had only declared himself as opposed to a state charter in the event that the comptroller denied the national charter."

Schramm contended that withdrawal of the application for a national charter had never been satisfactorily explained. During the hearing explanation was made that this was mainly because of the different methods of state and national banks in handling commercial and savings deposits with respect to "aggregation."

Schramm took the attitude that the new bank would be an unnecessary competitor of the two existing banks, and would seriously disturb their condition. To this R. W. McMinde, Clatsop county agricultural agent, replied by saying there was about \$300,000 ready for distribution in the two banks now under liquidation at Astoria, \$100,000 in bonds held by the Low-Columbia Dairy association and thousands of dollars in hoarded money that would immediately be deposited in the new bank.

DAIRYMEN TO WAR ON SUBSTITUTES

A meeting of county dairymen was held this afternoon at the K. of P. hall for the purpose of adopting plans and forming a county organization to combat the growing use of butter substitutes. This campaign is being taken up all over the country, and dairymen, creamery organizations and other related industries are waging a determined fight to increase the use of dairy products and eliminate the use of substitutes as far as possible. It is planned to form a local committee to direct a strong advertising and publicity campaign in Douglas county.

BLAZE DESTROYS SILVERTON HOME

SILVERTON, Ore., April 8.—Fire of undetermined origin practically destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Ward here late Monday night. Neighbors said the Wards had gone to Salem to consult a physician, and to spend the night.
