LOS ANGELES, April 8.—Primo Carnera, the Italian mountain brawler, will hold his 250-pound fight against the 200-pound opponent of his current American tour.

Opponent No. 14 is Nell Clisby, 200-pound Los Angeles negro, whose chief claim to fame hereabouts is that he once stayed six and one-half rounds with Black George Godfrey. Clisby has taken on quite a number of aspiring heavies, and has an enviable score of wins in his favor.

Even the black boy's staunchest supporters, however, are not expecting him to add to his string of knockouts as a result of his appearance with the Italian Giant. Carnera generally is considered the whole show on the bill, and a majority of the fans who are expected to fill the stadium to the rafters will lay down their hard cash just for the privilege of seeing the six-foot-seven-inch brawler in action.

Plans are made to entertain a \$10,000 house. Carnera is guaranteed \$10,000 for his end, with the privilege of 50 per cent of the gate. Clisby gets ten per cent of the net. Carnera, an extra-heavy heavyweight, will enter the ring "somewhere around 250 pounds." Clisby tips the scales at 200.

THEATRE MANAGER KIDNAPED, ROBBED

SEATTLE, April 8.—David Himeloch, manager of the Coliseum theatre here, was kidnapped and robbed of \$1700 today by two robbers who appeared at his home before he was out of bed.

Himeloch was forced to dress and accompany one of the men to the theatre in his own car, where the robber took the cash after firing once into the ceiling to force Nick Schmitt, assistant manager, to open the safe. The holdup man then disappeared in the manager's car.

The other bandit left Himeloch's home, where he had remained guarding the family, at about the same time his accomplice left the theatre office.

THE SECRET OF LONG LIFE AND HAPPINESS

Anyone of great age who is still lovable and enjoying life is an inspiration. Just such a person I had a heart-to-heart visit with a few weeks ago—Sylvia Jane Wilson, 101 years old. Her silken hair had been a light brown, and much of the brown was still evident among the gray.

Her black eyes, now somewhat faded, lighted up as she talked; kindness was evident in her voice, and her whole being radiated cheer.

She was born in Tennessee on June 18, 1828, the tenth of thirteen children. When Sylvia Jane was 13 her father started west in a home-made flat bottomed boat with the family and household goods and finally settled in Missouri. By 1862 Sylvia Jane had a husband and six children of her own, when they joined a wagon train with about one hundred others for a journey still farther west. The Wilsons occupied two covered wagons, one drawn by horses, the other by oxen.

She attributes her long life to inheritance, to plenty of work to keep her interested, staying at home of nights, a simple life in general, and to coarse, natural food that grew on the farm.

Speaking of her early life, she said: "I was brought up to work in the old-fashioned way. I had eight children of my own and raised two grand-children. Six of my children are living. I used to card and spin, and weave the cloth and make it into garments and blankets for my family. I began spinning when I was so small that a board had to be taken out of the floor to lower the spinning wheel so that I could turn the wheel."

"Then I suppose you were too busy for any outside interests," said.

"Oh, no. My father was a minister," she replied, "and I was taught to think of others as well as myself. My children learned to work and share the burdens of the family. So I found a good deal of time for church work and for helping others."—Matilda Vance Newman in the Sunday Oregonian, March 29, 1930.

STATE TAKES OVER ROAD PROBLEM IN SCOTTSBURG AREA

County Judge W. S. Hamilton was informed today by the highway commission that the state will take over the condemnation of land needed for highway purposes in the Scottsburg district.

The county court recently notified the commission that the county cannot condemn the right of way because of the limiting provisions of the law.

Remonstrances filed against the damages allowed have blocked the court from proceeding with its case, so that it is necessary for the state to take over the action if the present specifications are to be adopted.

The law under which the county court operates permits condemnation of a strip only 80 feet in width. In planning for construction work to be done this year on the section extending for a distance of five miles east from Scottsburg, the state is asking for a width of 200 feet in places where wide fills are necessary.

The county viewers went over the property to be secured for right of way, and assessed damages totalling \$8,948.20. Property owners appeared Friday with a remonstrance against the damages claiming that the amounts allowed were not in keeping with the value of the land.

While the law requires the county to pay for rights of way taken for roads, the width of the strip is limited to 80 feet, so that the county had no grounds upon which to contest the claims of the property owners.

The state highway commission, which is providing cooperation with federal funds on this project, was informed by the court of the situation, and notice was received today that the state, which has no limitations such as apply to counties, will take up the condemnation case and will proceed to secure the land. The county will probably be expected to pay the costs finally decided upon.

MARYLAND STORM SLAYS 5 NEGROES

BALTIMORE, April 8.—Five deaths were charged today to the swift wind and rain storm which cut a path across Maryland yesterday.

Three negro oyster tongs were thought to have drowned as the storm struck their motorboat in Chesapeake bay, off the mouth of West river. The sunken boat was found last night and it was thought their bodies would be located in its cabin. Two negro stevedores were drowned in Baltimore when the wind hit a scow
