

GANDHI'S SON AND OTHER FOLLOWERS FEEL LAW'S HAND

Selling of Salt in Civil Disobedience Campaign in India Brings Punishment.

SUIYAT, India, April 8.—Ram Das Gandhi, son of Mahatma Gandhi, who was arrested at Shimrad with volunteers Sunday for breaking the salt laws, was sentenced to 6 months' rigorous imprisonment today. Four companions were given similar sentences.

Seven Hurt in Clash
NEW DELHI, India, April 8.—Seven persons were injured at Shaladara, near here, today in a clash between police and volunteers who are supporting Mahatma Gandhi's campaign by collecting salt illegally.

Four others who were rendered unconscious were rescued by their companions and taken in a procession to Chandani square.

Strike Order Obeys
BOMBAY, India, April 8.—Most of the Hindu and Parsi shops in Bombay city suspended business today in response to the hartal, or strike call, of the Bombay congress committee of the India national congress. The hartal is in protest at arrest of K. F. Nariman and Jambhalal Bajaj for their activities in behalf of Mahatma Gandhi's salt law violators.

Nariman, who is a most prominent Swarajist, or Indian nationalist, was sentenced to one month's simple imprisonment for infringing the salt laws. Most of the local shops closed but a number of Moslem shops remained open. Two thousand school boys threw down their books and joined the hartal.

A message from Jalapur today said that Gandhi Thursday would commence a tour of the villages about him and urge the inhabitants to show mass disobedience of the salt laws, which is the first step in Gandhi's campaign of civil disobedience, by which the nationalists hope to obtain independence. Gandhi is due tomorrow at Bhirad, where his son, Ram Das Gandhi, was arrested Sunday.

May Arrest Gandhi
There was general expectation this morning that Gandhi would be arrested finally when he went to Aat to produce salt there, and a crowd of 8,000 persons gathered anticipating possible conflict scenes. There were no police at the scene, however, and when no attempt was made to interfere with Gandhi the throng dispersed.

Four Sentenced
During the day Maravati Jamnabai Bajaj, wealthy Bombay follower of Gandhi, was sentenced to two years' imprisonment for inciting the suburban residents of Bombay to break the salt laws. He had been specially selected to take charge of the civil disobedience campaign in the Bombay region.

Others receiving two-year sentences were three of Gandhi's lieutenants in the Kaira district of Bombay: Panchand Shah, Ravishanker Vyas and Bhoolal Vyas. They were convicted of breaking the salt laws.

FATHER OF PUBLIC DOMAIN TRANSFER MOVEMENT DIES

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., April 8.—Octaviano A. Larrazolo, 70, former United States senator from New Mexico and an expatriate of the state, is dead at his home after a serious illness of several months. His death last night removed a figure who has been prominent in public and political affairs of New Mexico for nearly three decades.

Larrazolo's health broke a year ago while he was still a member of the senate and he was forced to retire from public life, a few weeks before his term expired in March of last year.

LANE COUNTY WAR VET SUES U. S. FOR \$10,000

PORTLAND, Ore., April 8.—Leslie R. Stewart of Lane county, Oregon, started suit against the United States today in federal court for recovery of the benefits of a \$10,000 war risk insurance policy.

Stewart alleged that he suffered shock and exposures when he was thrown into the Atlantic ocean off the coast of Ireland when the American transport Tuscan was torpedoed on February 5, 1918.

He also claimed that while in France he was kicked by a horse which impaired his earning capacities.

SENATE PROBING RESIGNATION OF NAVY SPEED KING

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Lieut. Alford J. Williams, the recently resigned naval racing pilot, today told a senate committee a story of trials and triumphs through 13 years of struggling to conquer what he described as "the one thing in aviation" by which he was "tremendously attracted—unlimited speed in the air."

The crack pilot appeared before a senate naval subcommittee, which is investigating not only Williams' resignation from the navy, but also the position of the United States as compared with other nations in regard to the development of fast pursuit and bombing planes.

Williams told the committee his interest in high speed was "something of an obsession."

The pilot then described his struggle to "sell" the idea of privately subsidized planes to represent the United States in international competition, in which, he said, no government agency was participating against other nations, which were represented by government-fostered entries.

He asserted it took him two months to get permission from the navy to revamp his defective Mercury speed plane last fall, after repeated attempts had failed to raise the plane from the water in tests for the Schneider cup races.

He said the navy refused to give him a tug to take the plane back to the Philadelphia factory and that he borrowed a tug from the city of Baltimore through a friend.

When the four months' extension of leave he obtained from sea duty expired, he said, and the work of revamping the Mercury had not been completed, he was ordered to sea duty. He then resigned.

The senate resolution said this assignment "has had the effect of causing his resignation and bringing his valuable experiments to an end," and that "the United States is known to be deficient in the very type of plane" with which Williams had been experimenting.

The school is to be held in the building recently vacated by Spencer's store on Cass street, with classes every afternoon at 2 o'clock. The school is free to all housewives of Roseburg and vicinity.

"Women do not want to come out of the kitchen," Mrs. Langworthy says, "they merely do not want to be tied to the kitchen so that they can't do anything else."

"If they are given modern methods to supplant the old-fashioned drudgery, they are just as enthusiastic about housework as were their grandmothers."

From her experience in conducting a score of cooking schools, Mrs. Langworthy concludes that the modern housewife is most interested in "the little touches that add charm to the old dishes," in the "beefsteak and gravy" courses.

In party cookery, and in their specific problems such as "why cakes crack" and "why meringues fall."

"My purpose," she said, "is not to teach women to cook, but to give them inspiration in their housework, to bring them spring fashions in food, a sort of style show of the kitchen, and to point out 'life savers'—those many shortcuts which give her freedom for other interests."
