MENUS OFTEN LACKING IN TASTE APPEAL

Essential Foods Can Be Cooked and Served to Please Appetites

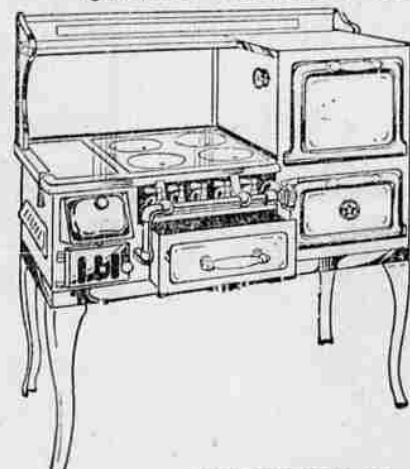
