M'CLURG SOBS AS DEATH OF WIFE IS RECITED AT TRIAL

EMMETT, Idaho, April 10.—Discovery of the partly burned body of Mrs. Mary McClurg, where it hung from the smoldering wreck of an automobile at the foot of a hill, was described in district court here today by Wirt Kennedy, one of the state's principal witnesses in the trial of her husband, John C. McClurg, charged with her murder.

Kennedy told of how McClurg had called him to the door of his ranch home last December 9, saying he had hurt his back and had crawled for a mile and a half from the scene of the wreck of his car. When Kennedy described the discovery of the young wife's body, McClurg's sobs were heard over the crowded courtroom.

Outlining the state's case yesterday afternoon Prosecuting Attorney H. M. Haag declared McClurg killed his bride of three months with a blow on the head, after he had been informed that a \$10,000 double indemnity insurance policy on her life was in effect. The burning of the automobile followed, the prosecutor declared.

Haag charged that McClurg had not been divorced from the last of his previous "two or three wives" when he married 21-year-old Mary Emerick at Cle Elum, Wash., last September. McClurg formerly resided at Grants Pass, Ore.

The case is being held in the symposium of the Methodist church here.

MORGAN'S \$2,500,000 YACHT
RIDES OCEAN FIRST TIME
BATH, Maine, April 10.—The Corsair, new yacht of J. P. Mor-

gan, New York financier, said to be the largest privately owned vessel of its kind in the world, was launched here today. The yacht, the second of her name, is 242 feet long and has an engine installation of 6,000 horsepower, its two turbo-electric units having a drive capacity of 16 knots.

Built at an estimated cost of \$2,500,000, the Corsair has cruising range of 25,000 miles.

ROCKEFELLER PARK STORY IS REVISED

PORTLAND, Ore., April 10.—In a special dispatch from its Washington, D. C., correspondent, the Oregonian said today that a misplaced decimal point, which put the amount of a fund given by the Rockefeller family to the national park service at \$16,000,000 instead of \$1,600,000, the correct amount, has given rise to a false idea in the west regarding the use of the fund.

"The \$1,600,000 given by the Rockefeller family will be used entirely for the acquisition of privately owned lands in Yosemite national park in California, the purpose for which it was given," the newspaper said. "Reports have been circulated that a \$16,000,000 fund was available for improvement work in all national parks, including Crater national park in Oregon."

All arrangements were completed yesterday by M. R. Brown, local manager, and Mrs. Harriet Langworthy, home service demonstrator for the Estate Stove company and Art Osberg, district sales manager.

The first class started at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and the school will continue Friday and Saturday with classes at the same hour each day.

The test of a stove is in the oven, Mrs. Langworthy told the ladies at the afternoon session today. Her demonstrations daily will be chiefly in the use of the oven. Her recipes today dealt with butter cakes and all their variations.

Tomorrow she will demonstrate sponge cakes and meat and vegetable cookery. Saturday's program will be varied.

Numerous attendance prizes are being offered, ranging from \$5 in gold to be given each day, to mer-

chandise prizes of various grades. Mrs. Langworthy and Mr. Osberg came to Roseburg directly from Grants Pass, where they just completed a very successful and interesting school. The attendance there was so large that it was necessary to secure larger quarters after the first day. Prior to going to Grants Pass they conducted a school at Ashland.

CHILD HEALTH DAY SET BY PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, April 10.—By proclamation of President Hoover, May 1 will be observed throughout the nation as child health day.

Regional chairmen in charge of plans for the observance gathered here today to arrange for the celebration, meeting under the auspices of the American Child Health association. They are to meet President Hoover tomorrow.

The president's proclamation, issued last night, said that "we shall fall short of our highest aspirations if we fail to practice all that science can give in service of our fundamental asset—our children" and called upon "all our people and all our agencies interested in boys and girls to assist" in making "this a day for organizing and coordinating interest in child health."

JUNIOR BASEBALL LEAGUE SHAPING FOR ZONE GAMES

South Douglas Unit Draws
Schedule; Idea Backed
by Legion to Aid
Citizenship.

Indications are that the junior baseball league, sponsored by Uniqua post No. 16, American Legion, will be a complete success this year. The central committee, as appointed by Commander Jas. A. Soules, is composed of E. A. Britton, chairman; Rudolph Ritzman, A. B. Cacy, H. H. Turner and B. E. Larson. This committee has divided the county into three baseball zones, the south, central and north zones. Rudolph Ritzman is in charge of the south zone. He has selected V. N. Phelps of Days Creek; E. R. Harvey of Glendale; C. E. Wilde of Riddle and T. H. Ireland of Myrtle Creek for his associates and together with them has already drawn up a twenty-four game series to be played as follows: April 12, Glendale at Myrtle Creek and Riddle at Days Creek; April 19th, Days Creek at Glendale and Myrtle Creek at Riddle; April 26th, Glendale at Riddle and Myrtle Creek at Days Creek; May 3rd, Myrtle Creek at Glendale and Days Creek at Riddle; May 10th, Glendale at Days Creek and Riddle at Myrtle Creek; May 17th, Days Creek at Glendale and Myrtle Creek at Days Creek. Then on June 7th the first and second teams made up of selected players from the zone, will play a game somewhere in the zone so that the committee in charge at that meeting will be able to select players to send to Roseburg to play for the county championship.

Other Zone Activities

A. B. Cacy has charge of the central zone. He is perfecting his organization of men to assist him in the work. Last Saturday one of his teams, the "Northlanders," played a picked team in Finlay Field and defeated it 8 to 2. This Saturday Mr. Cacy has arranged for the North Side and South Side teams to play early in the afternoon. The winning team of that game will play the West Side team a second game. Mr. Cacy wants the boys from nearby districts outside of Roseburg to understand that while they have no teams in their district, they are welcome to come in to Roseburg and practice there that they will be given a good tryout for a team.

H. H. Turner and B. E. Larson have called a meeting Thursday evening at 7:45 at French's garage in Sutherlin for the purpose of making a schedule for the north zone. They will have Harry Lasswell of Yoncalla, L. A. Heggie of Oakland and Mr. Francis of Sutherlin to handle teams in their communities. Drinn and Wilbur have not been heard from yet so it is not known whether or not they will have teams.

Eligibility Rules

According to the rules laid down

by the Department of Oregon, American Legion, it is necessary to have the team that is to represent Douglas county selected by June 20th. A list of players must be sent in to include birth certificates so as to make sure that no player will be shown up as ineligible because of being too old. In order to play a boy must be under seventeen years of age and must not become seventeen before September 15th next.

So far as can be found out, this county is ahead of any other so far in the organization of teams. That is just the thing that will help to win. All posts received notice at the same time and had the same chance to get busy. The boys are giving their best and all are anxious to make the team that will represent this county against other districts.

The American Legion is seeking no glory for the promotion of the league but is seeking to use baseball as a means of developing good citizenship, as it surely will do.

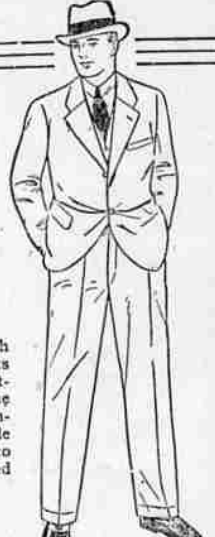
