NAVAL CONFERENCE RESULT SATISFIES MAC DONALD, PARIS

(Associated Press London Wire)

LONDON, April 11.—The "big five" delegates to the naval conference today decided to hold a plenary session on Monday for the purpose of reviewing the completed work of the conference.

The treaty will take the form of a three-part five power agreement in which the backbone will be a complete agreement between the United States, Great Britain and Japan on the limitation and reduction of all categories of a sea armaments and a supplementary agreement including France and Italy concerning matters upon which all the powers are in accord.

MacDonald Satisfied.—"We are very well satisfied with the treaty which is in prospect from our labors," said Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald. "The treaty is a substantial step in the direction toward which we have been striving in the face of difficulties which at times appeared to be almost insurmountable."

Paris Also Pleased.—PARIS, April 11.—Great satisfaction was expressed in official circles today at the way the naval conference was winding up.

The fact that France and Italy will be left in a position to continue negotiations is particularly stressed, as it had been feared that the conference might leave these two countries in a disagreeable situation that would increase the tension which has existed some time.

The arrangement whereby the question between the two countries remains open, with the British as arbitrators, is thought to be the best possible ending as far as France and Italy is concerned.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—President Hoover said today he had communicated to the American naval delegation at London his approval of the results achieved there.

The president said he commended the delegation members for their courageous actions. The most constructive accomplishment, the president said, is the abolition of competition in construction of naval arms.

SORDID DOMESTIC AFFAIRS TOLD IN M'CLURG'S TRIAL

EMMETT, Idaho, April 11.—Attempts to prove a motive in addition to the insurance for the alleged murder of Mrs. Mary McClurg by her husband, John C. McClurg, now on trial were made today by the state.

A certified copy of a record of a pending divorce suit filed by Mrs. Ena McClurg in the superior court of Stanislaus county, California, was introduced in evidence in an effort to show McClurg feared possible bigamy action as a result of his later marriage to Mary.

Witnesses were also placed on the stand who testified that the couple were worried about the prospective birth of a child.

Floyd Bolling and Leonora Baker, who claimed to have come from Yakima, Wash., to Idaho with the McClurgs, both testified that the McClurgs had been living together for several weeks in Yakima before being married. Much of this testimony was objected to by defense counsel on the ground that the character of the defendant was not an issue but it was allowed to stand.

Bolling testified that several times McClurg had threatened to kill his wife, but on cross examination admitted that McClurg had declared once that she was "too good to kill" and again that "life wasn't worth living without her."

Further cross examination brought out that Bolling was under sentence to McNeil island for violation of the Mann act while Leonora was sentenced to the reform school.

the average butterfat production per cow has been increased NINETEEN POUNDS. Even at the low average price of 40 cents per pound, it means an increased net income of \$36 per cow.

This statement is vouched for by E. J. Haslerud, extension dairyman at the North Dakota Agricultural college.

HERE is a little story related recently to this writer by O. I. Pantson, assistant supervisor of agriculture of the Union Pacific system.

"I was called in recently to test four dairy cows offered for sale by a man in Malheur county. These cows were priced at \$60, \$55, \$30 and \$55. Careful tests indicated that the \$60 cow was the most valuable producer in the lot, while the \$50 cow was the POOREST one."

THAT is what testing does. It shows up the "poor" cow that isn't paying her way, and enables her owner to save money and labor by sending her to the butcher.

The first step toward profitable dairying is weeding out the cows that COST MORE THAN THEY BRING IN. That is what cow testing associations are for.

AGAIN it is the story of quality. It is the high quality product, whether cows or truck crops, that brings a steady demand and shows a profit.

Notice is hereby given that the registration books for the registration of voters will close on April 15, 1930, and no more registrations may be made until after the Primary Election to be held on May 16, 1930.

In order to be fully qualified to vote at the Primary Election the following persons should register or re-register as the case might be: Persons who have not previously registered, persons who have not voted since the General Election of November, 1926, persons who will become 21 years of age prior to May 16th or who will have completed their citizenship prior to that date, persons who desire to change their political affiliation, or who have changed their precinct, and women who have married and changed their surname since registering.

No registrations may be made at the polls and only those who are regularly registered on or before April 15th may vote at the Primary Election.
