Organ Concert at Christian Church Greatly Enjoyed

Those who attended the organ concert last Thursday evening at the Christian church given by Alice Clement, dean of music of Linfield college, were unanimous in their hearty appreciation and praise of the high quality of the program numbers and the skill of the performer. To quote from a member of the audience as he was leaving the church "That was a real organ concert." The enthusiastic and spontaneous applause following each number showed that music lovers in Roseburg and the outlying communities appreciated the concert, have a true appreciation of a fine musical performance.

Miss Clement's charming personality and her verbal explanations and comments added much interest, gaining a warm personal contact with her audience.

The program was arranged in four scenes and progressed from the old world and early counterpoint style of the Chorale by Bach, through the period of the founding of the new world and its ideals, to the sacrifice involved in the gaining of freedom and unity in our country.

The first number in this group was the "Star Spangled Banner," played in many variations, showing especially the skilled technique in the variation, which was played entirely on the foot pedals. The audience was requested to stand only on the initial theme of the national song. The thrilling "full organ" of this was followed by the more quiet and steady "March Funebre" and "Chant Serephique," by Gubman.

The last scene depicted, through four beautiful and descriptive musical pictures, the grandeur of the west and our own Oregon, with its Indian background, its rugged canyons its dainty brooks and its majestic ocean with the incessant breakers whirling high upon the rocks. During the last number "On the Coast," by Beethoven, the audience was surprised with the exact imitation through careful manipulation of stops and pedals, of the dashing ocean waters.

Miss Clement was assisted by Mrs. Charles Brand, soprano, whose numbers were beautiful and enthusiastically received. Her clear voice was heard in her first number "Post Thou Know That Sweet Land." The second of the vocal group, "My Mother Hides Me And My Hair," by Hadyn, was of the older style and well received. The audience following Mrs. Brand's three numbers, spoke for their appreciation. She was accompanied on the organ by Miss Clement.

The concert was given under the auspices of the Douglas County Music Teachers' association, which is to be commended on its choice of artists.

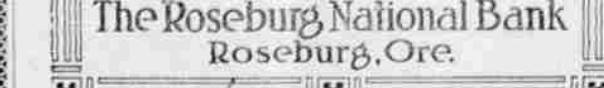
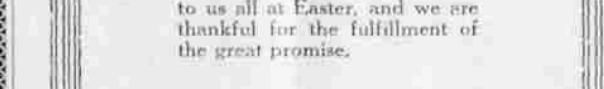
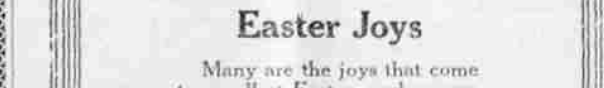
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WM. DAUGHERTY OF MEDFORD WINS ORATORY CONTEST
