THE KINGLY GRACE OF SYMPATHY

King Alfonso, who has been receiving as many as eighty visitors in one day in civil and military audiences since former Premier Jose Antonio Canales Guerra's anti-monarchist speech that stirred such an uproar and who has been entirely engrossed with political affairs, made his first excursion away from the capital this week, leaving on Monday morning and returning on Tuesday night to be on hand for General Primo de Rivera's funeral. His excursion was to one of the most unhappy spots of his realm, and the journey showed considerable thoughtfulness for others. The trip was to the vil- lages of Las Hurdes, numbering about fifty, most of them with a population of a hundred or less, most of the inhabitants living in miserable conditions. King Alfonso had ordered a road put through these wretched places and asked priests to go there, which they did.

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True sympathy's a kingly grace And well becomes a royal race. Alfonso touches all our hearts. When he shows forth these kindly arts. To help to build the peasants' roads And put his shoulders 'neath their loads And cheer and comfort to them bring Is work most fitting for a king.

PROBE BEGUN IN TRAIN-BUS CRASH THAT KILLED 19

ISLETA, N. M., April 12.—Nineteen persons were definitely known to have lost their lives yesterday, and ten were injured in the most disastrous motor bus accident in the history of motor transportation in the southwest.

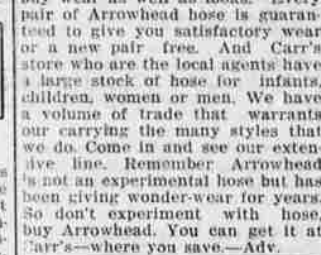
Little evidence of the tragedy remained here beside the ancient Indian pueblo of Isleta where a speeding Santa Fe mail train struck and demolished a loaded Pickwick Greyhound bus on a grade crossing, hurling pieces of the crushed machine and parts of its occupants in its path.

After the collision blazing gasoline burned the clothing. Inflammable parts of the wrecked bus were consumed also. The bus was enroute from Los Angeles to Denver.

In the aftermath of the collision today the identification of thirteen of the victims was only comparatively certain. So broken were their bodies that their identity had to be learned from letters and effects and their baggage. Undertakers who gathered up the bodies were forced to list the victims as "known dead" and "probable dead." Officials of the state moved to investigate thoroughly the cause of the crash.

Of the 29 persons in the bus when the crash occurred not one escaped death or injury. Nine of the injured, seriously but not fatally hurt, were in hospitals here and one was able to go to a hotel after treatment.
