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17 MINERS DIE IN CARBONADO BLAST

(Associated Press Special Wire) TACOMA, Wash., April 14.—Inability to name a cause for the explosion in the Pacific Coast Coal company's mine at Carbonado, 20 miles east of here, Saturday night, which cost the lives of 17 workers, was intimated last evening by mine officials and state and federal inspectors who visited the scene of the tragedy yesterday.

They spent the afternoon at the mine seeking an explanation for the disaster which was the worst in this district since 1899 when 33 lost their lives in the same mine.

Thus the 17 victims carried the cause for the explosion with them when they were killed by a powerful blast of searing flames and gas.

LENTEN ORATORIO FRIDAY NIGHT AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Saunders' famous oratorio, "The Crucifixion," one of the best known selections of Lenten music, will be presented Friday night at the First Christian church by a large union chorus, under the direction of Esie Lawrence Strang.

Buffalo Slaughter Blame Put on Government

Squaw Man Said Order to Slay Designed to Make Indians Easier to Conquer.

GLACIER PARK, Mont., April 13.—John LaMott, squaw man, early day frontiersman, veteran buffalo hunter and trapper, who died recently in his little log cabin on the border of Glacier national park reservation near here, complained placed upon the United States government full responsibility for the wholesale slaughter that resulted in the annihilation of the buffalo that once swarmed the prairies to the east of the Rocky mountains. Avaricious white men carried out the program, he said.

The Indians killed these animals only for meat, he explained, but upon the federal government must repose the blame for the extermination of these picturesque herds of wild animals.

This incentive upon the part of government officials, LaMott said, was first put into operation back in the late '70s. LaMott himself admitted having killed 43 buffalo in one day's hunt. He said in 1879 one Indian trader alone shipped 3800 buffalo hides down the Missouri river to the St. Louis far market. Many of these hides, LaMott declared, were turned in by Indians to whom the white traders gave cast-off government Springfield rifles. They traded on the basis of one rifle for each five hides.

LaMott, who was in his 80's when he died, had at least two Indian wives.
