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Tourists

OREGON was visited by more automobile tourists last year than California was, according to the record of registration made by the Oregon state motor association. Motorists from abroad registering in Oregon numbered 163,998; in California 98,953. Always up to now Oregon has been chiding itself for not trying harder to conform to the California pace in the inducement of motor-visiting. Now that it is discovered we not only equal but excel California in that regard, the time is being changed only slightly. We are now urged to equal California's efforts in detaining the motorists who come, the argument being that California knows just how to make every visitor stay a little longer than he had intended to do while we of Oregon are virtual tyros in that activity.

Oregon's well known inferiority complex gave rise to the conclusion that California was beating us on automobile tourists. When the figures explode that conclusion we straightway jump to another one to our own disadvantage, which is that California knows how to hold its visitors while we do not. As a matter of fact Oregon has a natural advantage over California as an automobile tourist's mecca. In summer, in the fact that ours is a relatively green land at that season, which is the natural vacation season. Relatively few motorists do their touring in winter, but those who do will naturally turn to California which has a climatic advantage in winter. The summer-touring majority, including Californians turn away from California because in summer California is dry and parched. They come to Oregon because our woods are green, our ocean breezes cool and our streams have water in them all summer.

Since summer is the accepted vacation season for most and since Oregon in summer is more attractive than California is, it follows as likely that we shall always have more automobile tourists here in summer than California will have.

ONE McGhee, candidate for prosecuting attorney in the Oregon house district, has turned out a statement of candidacy and no-

tives therefore that ought to be and probably will become a classic. The statement has been seized upon by the press with a you and us, someone is getting more free publicity for his candidacy than any other aspirant in the United States. As a contribution to the high purpose of making publication of his statement unanimous among newspapers we print it:

"I am an Arkansas hillbilly, born and raised in the Boston mountains north of Ozark, out in the dogs on Sunday morning to keep from having my face washed; did my spunking barefooted and on foot; never saw a train until I was 15 years old and was almost grown before I learned that republicans were human beings like other people."

"I have farmed with a double shovel and Georgia stock, and plowed an old mule 15 years old in new ground without casing—have taught school, preached and practiced law, and am a first class mechanic, having worked right smart around a sawmill and mill."

"I came to Crawford county five years ago and have since been elected to the legislature and have been operating on for appendicitis. Last year I married the finest little girl in Oklahoma and we are living together in Van Buren. I want the office because I think I can make a living out of it and will provide it elected to make things so warm for crooks and violators of all kinds that hell ain't 40 feet from the courthouse."

"I expect to spend the time between now and election on August 1, kissing the ladies, bragging on the women's cooking, complimenting the farmers on their crops and warning things up for my opponents."

There you have the ultimate in political frankness. The nearest approach to it we recall in Oregon was in the case of George Quinn, who, running for sheriff in Douglas county some years ago, published on his campaign card, as a statement of sound reason why people ought to vote for him, a group picture of his wife and seven or eight children. He won on that platform but he was a tyro compared to the Oklahoma hillbilly.

A true statement of most candidates would read about like this: "I seek the office because I want the money and the prestige that it would bring. I have no particular principles to espouse and am trying to trim my sails as best I can to catch votes. If you elect me I will not steal anything and I shall probably make as good an officer as the incumbent is doing. That is the most I can say with truth."

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Talks on Health

ALL too often we see children bolting their food. But it is not alone the children who do this. Many grown-ups who ought to know better rush through their meals. They act as if their lives depended upon finishing the meal in a given number of minutes.

This is all wrong. "But why is it wrong?" you ask. Well, teeth were given us for several very good reasons. They are needed to cut and grind the food. But the important fact is that digestion begins in the mouth.

It is not properly begun unless the food is thoroughly chewed and moistened by the saliva. This action of the mouth glands should be added before the food is swallowed. The first stage of digestion is thus well begun. The saliva contains a "ferment," a substance which begins the digestion of starchy foods.

Which the food is well-chewed is a soft, moist mass. Vegetables, cereals, bread and fruits have their digestion started in this way.

Food cannot be absorbed and assimilated unless it is liquid. For this reason the saliva of the mouth is important. The juices and digestive ferments of the stomach and intestine may be inadequate. The food should be prepared before it reaches the lower regions.

Food not properly chewed and mixed with saliva loses much of its value. Too much is left to the other organs.

The child or the adult who bolts his food is likely to be thin and undernourished. He may have cramps of the stomach and bowels. There can be no doubt that forms of indigestion may be traced to this cause.

In chronic indigestion the tongue is coated and the breath is offensive. Constipation is sure to follow.

While there are other reasons than the failure to chew the food. It is true that obstinate indigestion may produce poisons in the system. When this happens, they may be carried to different parts of the body. The next thing that happens is rheumatism, or some other serious malady.

Of course one cannot properly masticate the food if the teeth are defective. Dental treatment should begin in earliest childhood. It is a good rule for every child and adult to see the dentist at least every six months.

Do not hurry at meal time. It is a mistake for the child to rush through breakfast and lunch in order to be at school on time. The average business persons dashes through the midday meal at such a rate that proper mastication of food is impossible.

Such practices end in the evil of constipation. We are told that a great majority of diseases today are the outgrowth of constipation and poor digestion.

Be intelligent! Have good health! Take time to chew your food thoroughly. Eat calmly. Take care of your digestion and elimination at all times. Get up earlier in the morning so that the children will not have to hurry through breakfast to school. This is the only way to maintain good health.
